Junior Lifeguard Program Team Up With WIOA to Teach Youth New Skills

The Aquatics Division of the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community Recreational Services Department has partnered with the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) program to offer the Junior Lifeguard Program, a way for SRPMIC youth to earn money and learn a new skill. The program is offered in fall and spring sessions.

The goal is to teach Community youth to become trained and certified lifeguards, at which point they may want to apply for lifeguard jobs with the Aquatics division.

The first group of youth participated in the program this fall. Eight youth signed up for the fall session in October; the class ultimately ended up with six. Three of those six are eligible to become certified lifeguards with SRPMIC; the other three are currently ineligible because they don't yet meet the age requirements. They can continue on as junior lifeguards until they turn 15.

"We really want them to come work here for the Community and hope everything comes through," said Aquatics Manager Kyle Stephens. "We don't have any Community-member lifeguards, [which is why we're] pushing [the] Junior Lifeguard [program], the swim team—anything that we can [to] push [more Native Americans to become] swimmers."

Working with WIOA gives the youth an opportunity to have more time to learn how to become a lifeguard. A typical lifeguard class is usually a fourday class that is divided into a 12-week program.

The youth are learning the American

Red Cross curriculum and are doing the full lifeguard course.

"They are doing hands-on training in first aid, cardiopulmonary resuscitation, automated external defibrillator and water skills. We also included some swimming lessons," said Stephens.

He added that job-seeking skills also a part of the program. "We are teaching them a five-module curriculum [covering] the basics of how to create a résumé, how to interview, how to create an employment portfolio, how to be professional in the workplace, how to be on time to work, and more."

In this new program, SRPMIC youth are getting paid to train, working one-on-one with real lifeguards and performing as lifeguards by helping to maintain the safety of the pools and enforcing the rules.

White House Nominates Familiar Face to Lead IHS

Pueblo of Zuni citizen and longtime Indian Health Service (IHS) employee Michael Weahkee is expected to be confirmed as director of IHS.

President Trump nominated Weahkee in October for the lead position at IHS, which has been without a permanent leader for more than four years. It's not clear when Weahkee could be confirmed, but it could happen soon once the Senate votes. As of mid-December, Weahkee was listed online as principal deputy director of IHS, according to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

Weahkee previously served as CEO the Phoenix Indian Medical Center.

The last confirmed IHS director was Yvette Roubideaux (Rosebud Sioux Tribe), who left the agency in 2015. Since then, only "acting" directors have led IHS.

Pueblo Woman Named First Native to Washington **Supreme Court**

Raquel Montoya-Lewis (Isleta Pueblo) made history in the state of Washington recently when she was named to the Washington Supreme Court.

Montoya-Lewis is the first Native justice in the institution's history. Her appointment runs through next year, and the seat will be on the November 2020 ballot, according to the Seattle

Montoya-Lewis has 20 years of judicial experience. She has served as chief judge for three Native tribes in Washington.

Dakota 38+2 Memorial Ride

They ride horseback in snow, freezing temperatures and other harsh winter elements in remembrance of December 26, 1862, when 38 Dakota men were killed in the largest mass hanging in U.S. history. Two other Dakota men were later hanged in what is known in Indian Country as the Dakota 38+2. That horrific day was one result of U.S. federal policy to remove the Dakota people from their lands and open the area to white settlement.

The Dakota 38+2 Memorial Ride started on the Lower Brule Indian Reservation in South Dakota and ended in Mankato, Minnesota, on December 26. The annual 330-mile horseback ride began in 2005 as a memorial to those who died and a way to help youth connect with their culture. Native people young and old make the trek each winter across South Dakota to southern Minnesota

The 2020 Census Is Here

Native organizations across Indian Country are encouraging tribal citizens to participate in the 2020 Census.

The National Congress of American Indians (NCAI) has provided a free toolkit available online to help make sure all Native people are counted.

Nearly \$1 billion in annual federal resources is allocated to Indian Country based on census data, according to NCAI.

NCAI has offered the following tips: "Checking the box to indicate that you are American Indian or Alaska Native on the 2020 Census form is a matter of self-identification. No proof is required. No one will ask you to show a tribal enrollment card or a Certificate of Degree of Indian Blood (CDIB). Make sure to write in your enrolled or principal tribe, if applicable."


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'Star Wars' Family Night at Salt River Library

Everyone who stopped by could choose from the various activities, enter a raffle, or just talk about the Star Wars series. It was a great opportunity for families to spend quality time together.



Deadline for Arizona Travel ID Is October

Effective October 1, TSA airport security checkpoints will accept only the Arizona Travel ID driver license or ID card, the U.S. passport and other federally approved forms of identification.

If you depend on an Arizona driver's license for air travel, you'll need to get an Arizona Travel ID. The ID looks like a driver's license but has a gold star embedded in the card. The Arizona Travel ID complies with the federal REAL ID Act of 2005. The October 2020 deadline was set years ago.

Federally recognized tribal IDs fall under federally approved identification and can be used at airport security. To see a full list of acceptable identification, visit www.tsa.gov/travel/security-screening/identification.

To apply for an Arizona Travel ID, visit a Motor Vehicle Division office or third-party office and be sure to bring \$25 for the fee, a birth certificate or a U.S. passport, a Social Security card or W-2, and proof of residency in the form of two documents with your current address, such as a utility bill or bank statement.

All three were hired by the SRPD as lateral police officers. This means they already carry certification as peace officers within the State of Arizona after receiving prior police academy training.

Officer Roberts is from a small town in Iowa and graduated from Iowa State University. His passion for service began at the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office, where he served for more than three years. Officer Roberts enjoys spending time with his family and being outdoors.

Officer Guerrero is from California, and his passion for service brings 13 years of experience from Illinois and the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office. Officer Guerrero is very family oriented and also loves spending time with his friends.

Officer Boehmer is from Glendale, Arizona, and his passion for service began at the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office, where he served for three years. During his free time, Officer Boehmer enjoys rock climbing, playing soccer and playing music. He also loves all of

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
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An Update on the StrongLife Wellness Program

In June 2019, the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community began offering the StrongLife Community Wellness Program for SRPMIC members and their immediate family. This family wellness program was developed specifically for the SRPMIIC to help build strong lives and strong families, not only physically but also mentally, emotionally and spiritually.

StrongLife is open to all enrolled Community members and their immediate family members ages 5 and older residing in the household, even if they are not enrolled. The five pillars of the StrongLife program are Family Wellness, Social and Cultural Wellness, Emotional and Spiritual Wellness, Physical Wellness and Financial Wellness.

"Community members participate in activities within the five themes [to earn] points," said Community Wellness Manager Toni Harvier. Members can partake in any activities advertised around the Community that feature the StrongLife logo. Harvier added, "There is a maximum of 750 points with a monetary amount up to 500 points, which is 1 point equal \$1, and there is a minimum of 50 points to receive an incentive. Part of the overall points include taking a biometric screening and working on a major personal goal."

The program's next major event will be the StrongLife Wellness Expo on January 11, held at the Salt River Clinic from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Community members, spouses and children can sign up for the program and participate in the Know Your Numbers assessment, a biometric screening. When the screening is completed, the participants will receive a \$100 Visa gift card. The screening will be administered by Salt River Clinic nurses and will measure A1C (diabetes), cholesterol, blood pressure, lipids and more. The event will feature lunch, inflatable jumpers for the kids and entertainment by a chicken scratch band.

The StrongLife Wellness Program started in a limited way in June 2019, but the program officially kicks off this month (January 2020).

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

A significant number of Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community members are playing on the Westwood High School girls' basketball teams this season, with 12 young ladies on the freshman, junior varsity and varsity teams. Some of the girls even play on two teams. On Tuesday, December 10, all three teams played against the Copper Canyon Aztecs and all three were victorious.

Six SRPMIC members play on the varsity team, three of whom are seniors Daycee Achin, Sydney Carlos and Morning Star Scabby. Achin's sister, sophomore Nyese Jones, and Scabby's sister, freshman Kristine Scabby, also play on the freshman team. The sixth player on the varsity team is Aubri Scabby, who came to Westwood from Skyline High School. She is currently sitting out for the first 10 games and will be playing in the second half of the season.

"We always want to try and improve from what we did last year. We had a big group of returning girls from last season, so that helped," said West-

wood girls' varsity basketball coach Ron Campton. "Last year, we went 22-8 overall and went into the second round of the playoffs. He was 26. Townsend served the Community for five years as a patrol officer in the SRPD Field Operations Division. SRPMIC held a vigil for Townsend on January 11. A memorial service was held on January 14 at Christ's Church of the Valley in Peoria.



Wi-Bwa Grey is elected to fill an empty Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community Council seat on January 14. She was sworn in on January 23. The seat had been vacated after former Council member Ricardo Leonard was sworn in as the new SRPMIC Vice-President in December 2018. The Community has seven Council members; five are elected from District I, Salt River, and two are elected from District II, Lehi. Grey represents District I.



FEBRUARY

SRPMIC hosts the annual Walk for O'odham Piipaash on February 9. The 2-mile walk started and ended at the Lehi Community Building. The event was founded in 2003 by the O'odham Himdak/Nem Womk Chunichk Committee with a nearly 6-mile walk from Lehi through the riverbed to Friendship Park, where the Two Waters Building stands. Later, the tribal government took on the walk as a sponsored event to ensure its continuation each year.



The Salt River Eagles girls' basketball team ends the 2018-19 season with a second-place finish in the Canyon Athletic Association (CAA) Division 1 Arizona State Tournament. The Eagles ran off 14 straight regular-season and postseason wins before falling to St. John Paul II Catholic on February 18 at Talking Stick Resort Arena, home of the Phoenix Suns and Phoenix Mercury basketball teams.



AMC's "Ride with Norman Reedus" premieres its episode with a Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community connection on March 4. Norman Reedus is known for his role in the AMC show "The Walking Dead," and he is also a motorcycle enthusiast. Reedus and the show's film crew visited the Community and the Red Mountain Riders in 2018 to shoot a segment. Red Mountain Riders was founded in 2007 by George L. Lerma, James Osife, Leonard Villenueva and Gabe Castaneda.



MARCH

The Arizona Senate and House of Representatives recognize fallen Salt River Police Department Officer Clayton Townsend with a reading of House Concurrent Resolution 2035 on March 14 at the Arizona Capitol. While conducting a traffic stop two months earlier, Townsend was killed by a distracted driver texting on a cellphone. Townsend's family played a big role in implementing Arizona's new texting-and-driving ban.



The Salt River Tribal Library celebrates its 50th anniversary on April 26. The library, located on the second floor of the Way Of Life Facility, celebrated with live waila music outside and live deejay music inside. A hamburger and hot dog meal with cake was provided, as well as other festivities. The library has a collection of more than 15,000 books and periodicals. It's one of 16 tribal libraries in the state.



The Community hosts a play called "Native Nation" on April 20 at the Two Waters courtyard. The play was presented by ASU Gammage in partnership with Cornerstone Theatre Company. It featured mostly a Native cast, including a few Community members. The 90-minute play was written by Larissa FastHorse and directed by Michael John Garces.



The SRPMIC is inducted into the Scottsdale History Hall of Fame on May 9. The Community is one of six new inductees honored at a special dinner ceremony at the Scottsdale Resort at McCormick Ranch. Inductees serve as role models and must have a major impact on the City of Scottsdale. SRPMIC President Martin Harvier accepted the Hall of Fame plaque on behalf of the Community.



U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Deputy Secretary Eric D. Hargan visits the Community on May 8 to tour health-related facilities and meet with tribal leaders. While in Arizona, Hargan also visited with the Navajo Nation and Native American health officials in Phoenix. On May 9, Hargan spoke at the Secretary Tribal Advisory Committee meeting at Talking Stick Resort.



Manderee Jose is crowned Miss Salt River and Teegan Smith is crowned Jr. Miss Salt River for 2019-20. The 27th annual Jr. Miss Salt River Pageant was held on June 14, and the 31st annual Miss Salt River Pageant was held on June 15. Marisela Villegas was named Jr. Miss Salt River First Attendant and Isabella Dockerty was named Miss Salt River First Attendant.



JUNE

On June 15, the SRPMIC celebrates Community Day at the Two Waters Complex. President Martin Harvier read the SRPMIC Day Proclamation. The day was a celebration and included a free meal, vendors and live music. Community Day commemorates U.S. President Rutherford B. Hayes signing an executive order on June 14, 1879, to establish the Salt River Indian Reservation.

On July 12, the Salt River Police Department opens its new Property and Evidence Bureau in a special ribbon-cutting ceremony. The 13,778-square-foot facility is a storage facility and will have capacity for years to ensure that the SRPD meets industry standards and practices. It will be used for receiving, booking and storing criminal evidence, found property and property held for safekeeping. The building is on 4.5 acres and has a 2-acre vehicle impound unit. It sits near the Way Of Life Facility.



SRPMIC President Martin Harvier testifies in the Subcommittee Hearing on Tribal Infrastructure on July 11 in Washington, D.C. Harvier gave an opening statement on tribal transportation and infrastructure. He talked about the strain on the public safety and public works agencies that are responsible for maintaining and keeping existing roadways safe for travel. Harvier was one of three tribal leaders to testify.



SRPMIC breaks ground on a new USS Arizona memorial on August 13. The site of the memorial is near the Great Wolf Lodge and Salt River Fields at Talking Stick in the Talking Stick Entertainment District. It features a section of the boathouse from the USS Arizona, which was sunk during the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941. The memorial is set to open to the public in early 2020.



Arizona Superintendent of Public Instruction Kathy Hoffman visits Salt River schools not long after the start of the 2019-20 school year. On August 23, Hoffman toured the Early Childhood Education Center, Salt River Elementary School and Salt River High School. Hoffman was elected in November 2018 and assumed office in January 2019. She oversees Arizona's public-school system as head of the Arizona Department of Education.



Salt River Fields at Talking Stick is named Best Spring Training Ballpark of the Decade by Ball Park Digest, a media company that covers the business and culture side of Major League Baseball, minor league baseball and college ball. Salt River Fields is home to the Arizona Diamondbacks and Colorado Rockies during spring training. The 11,000-seat ballpark opened in 2011 and includes 12 practice fields. Salt River Fields is also home to the Salt River Rafters of the Arizona Fall League and other baseball leagues throughout the year.



The SRPMIC Social Services Department celebrates the completion of its renovation project with an open house on September 30. The renovations at the former Community Service building lasted more than a year; Social Services now occupies more than half of the space. Guests were led on tours and were shown how to best utilize the department's services.



Great Wolf Lodge opens a waterpark/hotel in the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community with a grand-opening celebration on October 17. The resort is located near Salt River Fields at Talking Stick in the Talking Stick Entertainment District. The waterpark is Great Wolf's 18th U.S. resort and its first in Arizona. It has a massive indoor waterpark with multiple slides and 350 hotel suites.



Salt River Elementary School teacher Lynette Stant was named 2020 Arizona Teacher of the Year by the Arizona Education Foundation. The third-grade teacher and 16-year SRES veteran is the first Native American teacher to win the award in its 37-year history. Stant was celebrated with four finalists at a special luncheon at the Arizona Biltmore in Phoenix. She also was recognized by the SRPMIC Council a few days after the award ceremony at a Council meeting.



The Huhugam Ki Museum celebrates its 32nd anniversary on November 2 with delicious mesquite pancakes and other goodies. The hours-long event included mesquite-pod milling, demonstrations of traditional cultural arts, vendors and tortilla sales. The museum features multiple displays of the history of the O'odham and Piipaash people, including the many who served in the military. The celebration was also a first look at a new exhibition installation.



NOVEMBER

On November 15, SRPMIC Administration and the Young River People's Council hosted a financial literacy workshop at the Way Of Life Facility that focused on Community youth ages 12 and older. Students made their way through the Seven Generation Money Management program, where they learned the basics of investing, opening a bank account, purchasing a car, renting an apartment, buying a house and other life skills by participating in mock demonstrations.



DECEMBER

SRPMIC Public Works employee Tommy Gardner is named the 2019 SRPMIC Tribal Employee of the Year. The winner was announced at the annual SRPMIC Tribal Employee Holiday Luncheon on December 4 at Talking Stick Resort. Gardner, a construction project supervisor for Public Works, was one of eight tribal employees nominated. The others were Lynette Aguilar, Michael Altamirano, Jordan Christensen, Kimberly Clark, Paul Johnston, Glen Law and Lou Lombari.



On December 14, the annual SRPMIC Light Parade lights up the Community in holiday spirit. The route started at the SRPMIC Community Building, went north along Longmore Road and ended at the Two Waters employee parking lot. Among the parade entries, Salt River High School won Most Spirited, Top Golf won Best Use of Lights and Color, Salt River High School JROTC won Best Walking, and SRPMIC Engineering and Construction Services won Most Unique. 



Monitoring Solutions for Loved Ones with Dementia

Dear Savvy Senior,

My husband, who lives at home, has dementia and I worry about him wandering off and not being able to get back. Can you recommend some monitoring technology devices or any other solutions that can help me keep tabs on him?

Exhausted Spouse

Dear Exhausted,

This is a concern for millions of Americans caring for a loved one with dementia at home. About 60 percent of people who suffer from dementia wander at some point, according to the Alzheimer's Association.

For caregivers, this can be frightening because many of those who wander off end up confused and lost, even in their own neighborhood, and are unable to communicate who they are or where they live. Here are some product and service solutions that may help.

Simple Solutions

For starters, there are a number of simple home modifications you can do to keep your husband from wandering away. Some solutions include adding an extra lock on the top or bottom of the

exterior doors out of the line of sight or installing door alarms on the exterior doors that let you know when they're opened. See *AlzStore.com* for a variety of product solutions. And, be sure you hide the car keys to keep him from driving

You should also alert your neighbors that your husband may wander so they can keep an eye out and have a recent picture of him on hand to show around the neighborhood or to the police if he does get lost.

Monitoring Technology

For high-tech solutions, there are a variety of wearable GPS tracking devices available today that can help you keep tabs on him. Some top options to consider include AngelSense (AngelSense.com), which can be attached to clothing or worn around the waist; wristwatches like the Theora Connect (TheoraCare.com) or NurtureWatch (NurtureWatch.com); and the GPS SmartSole (GPSSmartSole.com), which is a shoe insole tracker.

All of these products come with smartphone apps that would alert you if your husband were to wander beyond a pre-established safe area and would let you know where to find him if he did. These products (except the GPS SmartSole) also provide two-way voice communication and auto pickup speakerphone so you can talk to him if he does wander off.

Locating Services

If the previously listed options don't work for you, there are also locating services – like the MedicAlert + Safe Return program (*MedicAlert.org/alz*) and Vitals Aware Services (*TheVital-sApp.com*) – that can help you if he does wander off.

The MedicAlert + Safe Return program comes with a personalized ID bracelet that would have your husband's medical information engraved on it, along with his membership number and the toll-free MedicAlert emergency phone number. If he goes missing, you would call 911 and report it to the local police department who would begin a search, and then report it to MedicAlert. Or, a Good Samaritan or police officer may find him and call the MedicAlert number to get him back home.

The Vitals Aware Service works a bit differently. This is a free app-based network system that comes with a small beacon that your husband would wear. If he did go missing, anyone in the Vitals app network community that came within 80 feet of him would receive an alert and information about him so they could contact you.

Another option that could help, depending on where you live, is a radio frequency locater service like SafetyNet and Project Lifesaver, which are offered by some local law enforcement agencies.

With these services, your husband would wear a wristband that contains a radio transmitter that emits tracking signals. If he goes missing, you would contact the local authorities who would send out rescue personnel who will use their tracking equipment to locate him. Visit *SafetyNetTracking.com* and *Projectlifesaver.org* to see if these services are available in your community.

PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD NOTICE: AMENDMENT TO THE ZONING ORDINANCE, CHAPTER 25 OF THE SRPMIC CODE OF ORDINANCES

On December 4, 2019 in general Council session, and in accordance with the SRPMIC Ordinance Development Policy (Policy 1-20), the SRPMIC Council approved a public comment period of one-hundred twenty (120) days for amendments to the Zoning Ordinance and Zoning Map, Chapter 25 of the SRPMIC Code of Ordinances. The public comment period begins December 5, 2019 and ends at midnight April 2, 2020.

The purpose of the 2019 Amendments to the Zoning Ordinance is to improve formatting and clarify language, update certain Articles/Sections of Zoning Ordinance for clarification, simplification, or to reflect development needs, and to update the zoning map for use of tribally owned land for government services.

The Zoning Ordinance establishes laws and regulations that define how property in specific zones can be used, the application processes for reviewing and approving uses and development, and the regulations on building and site improvements, such as size, intensity and setback of buildings, parking, lighting, signage and landscaping. Community Council adopted the current Zoning Ordinance on July 1, 2015.



This serves as notice that the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community ("SRPMIC") Council pursuant to Article VII, §1(g) of the SRPMIC Constitution and Sections 7-72 through 7-75 of the SRPMIC Code of Ordinances decided on December 18, 2019 at a regularly scheduled Council Meeting to permanently exclude Jesus Manuel Flores, Francisco Luna Mendoza, and Abraham M. Arellano-Valadez from the boundaries of the SRPMIC. On October 29, 2019, the Exclusion Committee held a hearing and determined that Jesus Manuel Flores, Francisco Luna Mendoza, and Abraham M. Arellano-Valadez were non-members whose presence is detrimental to the peace, health or morals of the SRPMIC based on the significant number of police contacts that the Salt River Police Department has had over a three (3) year period regarding reports of burning trash, illegal dumping of trash and dead roosters, the promoting and holding illegal cockfighting matches, complaints of noise, smells and smoke, public intoxication and disorderly conduct, and animal cruelty. These police contacts occurred at 3001 N. Harris Drive and were conducted by Jesus Manuel Flores, Francisco Luna Mendoza, and Abraham M. Arellano-Valadez

Jesus Manuel Flores, Francisco Luna Mendoza, and Abraham M. Arellano-Valadez's permanent exclusion is effective immediately. Therefore, they are not allowed to be within the territorial boundaries of the Community, including driving or passing through, visiting others, residing or coming within the Community boundaries at any time for any reason.
