SRFD Establishing Its Own Pipes and Drums Band

Xavier Martinez has wanted to establish a bagpipes and drums band at the Salt River Fire Department for a while. The idea was sparked when Martinez, a member of the SRFD Honor Guard, saw bagpipers at some events that the honor guard attended.

Martinez, a firefighter and paramedic since 2012, led the charge and worked along with others in the fire department to make it happen. The SRFD band is believed to be the first such band in Indian Country.

Respected Pipe Major Leonard Wood, who teaches people to play pipes around the Valley, visits Martinez's fire station at Talking Stick Resort once a week for practice. He asks those learning to practice on their own at least 20 minutes a day. Martinez said he's also worked with Wood one-onone to hone his craft.

The group has been practicing the bagpipes and snare drums once a week for months, and all the hard work is paying off. The band is expected to make its public debut in February during the unveiling of the USS Arizona Memorial Garden at Salt River, near Salt River Fields at Talking Stick.

Bagpipes and snare drumming have been a fixture in public safety and the military for years.

Martinez did his research and saw a similarity between what bagpiping represents and its history to his own cultural ties in Salt River. Firefighter and paramedic Joseph Christopher is another Community member who is part of the band.

"When we do ceremonies and funerals, we have gourds, traditional songs, basket dancers," Martinez said. "The Scottish do the same thing, but instead of the

U.S Census Bureau Hiring in SRPMIC

The 2020 U.S. Census is here, and the Census Bureau is working with the tribal government to find Community-member candidates to become Census workers.

The Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community has hosted multiple opportunities for Community members to learn about the Census jobs, with questions answered by U.S. Census Bureau workers.

Applicants must be 18 or older and a U.S. citizen with a valid Social Security number. If a



paid weekly, and workers can expect their first paycheck 10 to 14 days after their first day, according to the U.S. Census Bureau.

Since 1790, the federal government has counted everyone living in the United States every 10 years. The count is required by the Constitution. Many services provided by the federal government are apportioned based on population, which is why an accurate count is essential. The Census determines how many seats each state gets in the U.S. House of Representatives, how more than \$600 billion in federal money is distributed, and where new infrastructure projects or improvements are needed.

job offer is accepted, applicants must pass a criminal background check and review of criminal records. Most Census jobs require access to a personal vehicle and a valid driver's license, unless public transportation is readily available. Mileage is reimbursed at 58 cents per mile in the field. Access to a computer with an internet connection is also required for training.

The type of U.S. Census job varies based on qualifications. A flexible schedule is a must. Field positions are flexible; some require work during daytime hours, while others require weekend and evening shifts. Employees are

Youth of the Year is the Boys & Girls Club's comprehensive leadership-development program that includes Youth of the Month,





U.S Census Bureau Hiring in SRPMIC



The 2020 U.S. Census is here and it wants everyone to be counted. April 1 is Census Day and every home will have received an invitation to participate in the 2020 Census. Census responses are confidential and answers are used only to produce statistics.



Are you looking for work and have a flexible schedule? The U.S Census is hiring, especially those familiar with Indian Country. A push is underway to hire Native Americans as Census workers for their communities. To apply online, visit 2020census.gov/jobs, or call 1-855-562-2020 for related questions.

Census responses are confidential and answers are used only to produce statistics.

Native populations have been notoriously undercounted over the decades. A push is underway in Indian Country to hire Native Americans as Census workers for their communities because people are familiar with the area and there is a trust factor when someone sees a familiar face.

The SRPMIC is not an exception. Even though the Community is on the edge of one of the largest metropolitan areas in the country, it can be challenging to navigate correctly. Other reservations, like the Navajo Nation, which encompasses more than 27,000 square miles, battle similar and yet different obstacles when it comes to the count. It is hoped that these efforts will result in a more accurate count of American Indians in the 2020 Census.

To apply online for a full-time or part-time Census position, with wages ranging from \$19.50 to \$22 per hour, visit 2020census.gov/jobs or call 1-855-5622020 for related questions. For questions related to future on-site opportunities with the Census, call William Robles at (480) 362-6849. Note that applying online remains the same no matter where you log onto the internet.

instrument being a gourd, it's a bagpipe."

In December, award-winning and world-class pipe major Bruce Gandy visited the Community to teach a oneday class. Martinez and others attended. with some coming from as far away as New Mexico and Texas. "Hosting that guy was pretty huge," Martinez said. Gandy has roots in the United Kingdom and is based in Victoria, British Columbia, Canada. The class learned how to play traditional Scottish music called Pibroch.

"What I learned is that Pibroch is really hard-it's a lot of movements, technical movements," Martinez said. "I better understand the music and what it represents and how we can relate that back to our Community and culture."

The Salt River Fire Department Pipes and Drums is part of the Arizona Fire Service Pipe Band, which represents multiple departments across the state and comes together during large ceremonies or events.

Martinez created a special Salt River Fire Department tartan that he registered with the Scottish Register of Tartans. The patterned cloth can be found online at www.tartanregister.gov. uk. The design includes red and black to represent fallen firefighters, and blue, yellow and white to represent the SRP-

MIC flag (see sample on cover page). The blue also represents the Salt River and the yellow also represents willow baskets.

Last year, Martinez designed a special commemorative coin to help raise money to establish the band. The unique coin is \$20, with proceeds going toward the training cost for each member of the group. The coin's front says "Salt River Fire Department Pipes and Drums" and includes the department's scramble, a traditional Scottish belt and a water design on the outside to represent the Community. On the back is the same water design, Red Mountain, a bagpiper silhouette, and Kwthlyxuux Shxaayk

and Iiwaa Waly Kuupiitmak in the Piipaash language, which translate to "Honor the Fallen" and "Never Forget." Martinez said he reached out to elders in the SRPMIC Cultural Resources Department for assistance with the translation.

"I think the coin does a pretty good job at representing who we are and what we are about," Martinez said.

Encountering Wild Animals Around the Community

The Arizona desert is home to a variety of animals, and the new development reaching the desert and mountain ranges that surround the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community drives those desert animals into neighborhoods and communities to find food or just because we are living in their space.

Salt River Police Department Ranger Thomas Gallagher has some advice on what to do if Community members come face to face with wild animals.

"There are a number of animals that we have come across in the Community," said Gallagher. "Such as coyotes, three badgers roaming around at Talking Stick Golf Course. Badgers are rarely seen in developed areas, so their encounters with people are rare. The Rangers responded and the badgers were relocated to the river.

There have been sightings of coyotes and bobcats near Salt River Fields, Talking Stick Golf Course and the Red Mountain area. Gallagher also mentioned that beavers are often located near the Granite Reef Dam and the Salt River Materials Group near McKellips Road.

Which animals should Community members most be aware of? "The coyotes are the peskiest to the Community members," said Gallagher. "But the only reason they would be a threat is if they had their young nearby. Most animals are skittish around humans; the only reason they would not be skittish is if they are carrying rabies." Rabies makes animals more aggressive. The last known report of rabies in the Maricopa County area was months ago, Gallagher said, and when an animal with rabies is reported it's usually something small, like a rodent.

"It's not reported that much because animals who get rabies usually die before they do any harm. The disease make them dehydrated because they can't really eat or ingest water," said Gallagher.

When should you watch out for wild animals? All year around, explained Gallagher.

"For the most part we don't have too many seasonal animals out here right now. A lot of the cold-blooded animals like snakes and lizards go off and hide because it's too cold," said Gallagher. "I have come across a couple of snake dens near the old Trap and Skeet. [Snakes] lump together in the dens for the body heat; they move really slow because they're cold, but they are still alive and still can strike. These dens can be anywhere."

Rangers encourage people to steer clear of eagle nests in the Community because if you disturb them, they will feel threatened and may not return.

"Most wild animals run away when they see humans, but don't make them feel threatened because they might try to defend themselves," said Gallagher. "You're more likely to get chased or attacked by dogs out here than any of these wild animals."

If you see a wild animal in the Community, call the SRPD Rangers at (480) 850-8200 to come out and relocate it.

Little Shell Tribe of Chippewa Indians to Become 574th Federally Recognized Tribe

A tribe in Montana is one signature away from becoming the 574th tribe federally recognized by the United States.

The Little Shell Tribe of Chippewa Indians, a state-recognized tribe in Great Falls, Mont., is expected to be formally recognized by the U.S. Government when President Trump signs the National Defense Authorization Act. The tribe's recognition is part of a measure that was inserted into the act.

The tribe has been fighting for federal recognition for decades.

Former Oneida Nation Leader Walks On

Rick Hill, former chairman of the Oneida Nation in Wisconsin and chairman of the National Indian Gaming Association, has passed away. He was 66.

Under Hill's leadership, the gaming association became a nationally recognized voice in Washington D.C., according to Indianz.com.

Hill was an executive producer for "Bright Path," a film currently in production based on the life of Jim Thorpe. Hill, the movie, cast and production team were acknowledged in December at the 43rd annual Lakota Nation Invitational sports competition in Rapid City, South Dakota. The event attracts thousands of people, and footage from the games is expected to be used in a

documentary by the same production company working on "Bright Path."

Trump Signs Measure to Preserve Native Languages

In December, President Trump signed legislation that extends federal grant programs aimed at preserving Indigenous languages. The measure cleared the U.S. House and Senate.

The legislation was named after Esther Martinez, a traditional storyteller and Tewa language advocate from the Ohkay Owingeh Pueblo in New Mexico, according to the AP.

There are more than 40 active grants used for Native language preservation and immersion, totaling more than \$11 million, according to the AP.

New Mexico Sports Editor Called Out for Using 'Scalp' on Social Media

After the Shiprock Chieftains of the Navajo Nation were defeated 95-39 by Hobbs High School in New Mexico, the local newspaper's sports editor tweeted that Shiprock was "scalped."

Hobbs News-Sun sports editor Jason Farmer later said his tweet was "very inappropriate and completely insensitive" after being called out by Navajo Nation President Jonathan Nez and Vice President Myron Lizer.

"Native American people continue to fight discrimination and racism to this day, and the comment from Mr. Farmer only adds to the lack of respect for our Navajo people," Nez said in a statement.

It's not clear whether Farmer was disciplined by the newspaper.



About 10 years ago in Prescott, a group of athletes celebrated history as the Salt River High School girls' basketball team captured the 2009-10 Arizona Division 1A State Championship.

Salt River beat a tough Gila Bend Monsters team at the Toyota Center to cap a successful season, unlike any season that came before. The championship was Salt River High School's first state title, and today the team's state title banner hangs high in the high school gym. The banner displays the names of each member of the team.

Dashia Enos, a senior and a key guard on the title team, remembers that remarkable season well, even 10 years later. She has kept many photos and even more memories.

"I remember being so excited," she said. Winning it "was an awesome feeling, a reality check, like did this just happen?"

It sure did. Dozens of Salt River fans poured into the Toyota Center to watch their team pull away after a close first half. Once the final buzzer rang, the team cut down the basketball hoop net and raised the first-place trophy. A couple days later, the Community hosted a celebratory parade from the high school to the Council Chambers.

Enos said Salt River lost only a few games that season and beat bigger schools along the way, including Westwood High School in a tournament in Payson, where the Eagles placed third.

Now, 10 years later, this year's Salt River girls' team is working to get back to the big stage. Coming off a second-place finish at the state tournament last year, this year's team is off to a solid start at 6-1 as the postseason approaches in February.

Enos has some advice for this year's team and other Native athletes working to get better each day:

"Practice makes better, it doesn't make perfect."

"Don't underestimate your opponents.

"Remember, this is your second family and we succeeded because we stayed close together."


"With a new team, it takes a while to teach players the game of softball. So far, these girls are going the extra mile and are starting to play to my satisfaction," said Villegas.

PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD NOTICE: AMENDMENT TO THE ZONING ORDINANCE, CHAPTER 25 OF THE SRPMIC CODE OF ORDINANCES

On December 4, 2019 in general Council session, and in accordance with the SRPMIC Ordinance Development Policy (Policy 1-20), the SRPMIC Council approved a public comment period of one-hundred twenty (120) days for amendments to the Zoning Ordinance and Zoning Map, Chapter 25 of the SRPMIC Code of Ordinances. The public comment period begins December 5, 2019 and ends at midnight April 2, 2020.

The purpose of the 2019 Amendments to the Zoning Ordinance is to improve formatting and clarify language, update certain Articles/Sections of Zoning Ordinance for clarification, simplification, or to reflect development needs, and to update the zoning map for use of tribally owned land for government services.

The Zoning Ordinance establishes laws and regulations that define how property in specific zones can be used, the application processes for reviewing and approving uses and development, and the regulations on building and site improvements, such as size, intensity and setback of buildings, parking, lighting, signage and landscaping. Community Council adopted the current Zoning Ordinance on July 1, 2015.




