# Native Youth Well Represented in the Westwood High School Girls Basketball Teams

This season, the Westwood High School girls' basketball teams have seven girls from the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community. During their game against the La Joya Community Lobos on December 7, the varsity starting five were all Native American, with three of them representing Salt River: Maggie Makil and sisters Daycee Achin and Nyese Jones. The team also includes juniors Sydney Carlos and Morning Star Scabby, who play's for both the junior varsity and varsity teams. "We have quite a bit of girls from Salt River that have been playing for a while and they go out there and shoot the ball," said Ron Compton, the Westwood girls' varsity basketball coach. "[In] our program, top to bottom, we've probably got ab ut 60 percent Native American [players], so our starting five tonight were Native American." Before kicking off their 2018-**Q1** 9 season, the girls participated in the Moon Valley Feast or Famine Tournament against

the Flowing Wells Caballeros, Sunnyslope Vikings, Boulder Creek Jaguars and Liberty Lions; Westwood went 2-2 in the tournament.

The varsity girls kicked off their first game of the season of the 6A East Valley Division playing against the Westview Knights, winning 62-21. The varsity team won their next three games against the Shadow Ridge Stallions, 68-30; San Luis Sidewinders, 57-11; and Copper Canyon Aztecs, 69-36. Their first loss of the season was to the Mountain Lions at Red Mountain, 43-47. That loss didn't keep them down, as they won their next four games in December against the La Joya Community Lobos, 81-17; Tucson Badgers, 56-52; Maryvale Panthers, 57-43; and Alhambra Lions, 43-27. In their final game of the first half of the season, Westwood lost to the Dobson Mustangs in a close game with a final score of 53-55.



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
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
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# **SRPMIC Host 2018 Annual CANAR Conference**

The 2018 Annual Consortia of Administrators for Native American Rehabilitation (CANAR) Conference was hosted by the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community and held at the Talking Stick Resort December 9-13.

CANAR's mission is to serve as an avenue of collaboration and cooperation between administrators of rehabilitation agencies serving American Indian and Alaskan Native persons with disabilities to enhance the quality of service, resulting in positive employment outcomes.

On December 10, the conference kicked off with an opening ceremony and grand entry of people from more than 40 tribes representing their communities. The Salt River High School JROTC posted the colors, and SRPMIC Vice-President Martin Harvier delivered the welcome address.

"I was impressed with the display of the flags of the tribes that are represented here," said Harvier. "I want

to thank you for what you do. I want to thank our [SRPMIC] staff as far as working with our members with disabilities and giving them the opportunities of employment. It takes special people in different fields to do the work they do... the understanding that you have, the heart that you have .... That's how I feel that people have to genially feel the love that they do work for to help their lives be better, and that's a reflection on each and every one of you here representing your tribes."

A Special Election has been called to fill an upcoming vacant District I (SR) Council Member Seat. The vacancy is due to District I (SR) Council Member Ricardo Leonard being newly elected as the Vice-President at the recent General Election. The remaining two year term will be filled by this Special Election.

You are able to vote in SRPMIC elections if you are: 1) an enrolled member of the Community, 2) 18 years or older on the day of the election, and 3) a resident of District I (Salt River) for at least one (1) year; or if you are a non-resident, declared District I (SR) as your home district. Persons who are in jail or prison on the date of election, or have been declared to be mentally incompetent are not eligible to vote.

## POLLING SITE

District I (Salt River) voters vote at the SALT RIVER COMMUNITY BUILDING. (Polls open from 6 a.m. - 6 p.m.)

## WHAT DISTRICT DO I VOTE IN?

Members who live West of North Mesa Drive are considered to be a District I (Salt River) voter and should vote at the Salt River Community Building. Non-resident voters who have filed a form with the Office of Membership Services declaring District I (Salt River) as their home district are eligible to vote in this Special Election. If you are not sure which district you vote in, please contact the Office of Membership Services at (480) 362-7600.

# A SRPMIC TRIBAL ID IS REQUIRED TO VOTE.

Enrolled members must show a (picture) tribal ID card at the polls before they will be given a ballot. Contact the Office of Membership Services at (480) 362-7600 if you need a new tribal ID card. The Community membership rolls determine voter eligibility and the district in which you vote in, so please make sure your name, tribal ID number, and address are up-to-date with the Office of Membership Services (located at Two Waters Building B, 3rd Floor.



FORUM GUIDELINES:

- \* Each candidate will be given two (2) minutes for an opening statement.
- \* Community members will be encouraged to ask questions of the candidates.
- \* Questions should relate to issues and not be of a malicious (attacking) nature.
- \* Community members may direct a question to an individual candidate or more than one candidate.
- Community members asking more than one question shall be considerate of others wishing to address candidates.
- \* Candidate response to questions will be limited to two (2) minutes.
- \* Each candidate will be given two (2) minutes for a closing statement.
- \* A promptor will be posted up front with time pards at 1 minute and 20 accorde to



- A prompter will be seated up front with time cards at 1 minute and 30 seconds to assure responses are met in a timely manner.
- Candidates that will be absent during the Community forums may have a statement read by the forum Moderator or a person of their choosing. So long as adequate notification is provided to Community Relations (at least 24-hour notice). Should a candidate request this process they must provide Community Relations with the individuals name, contact number and copy of the statement. The statement shall be no longer than five (5) minutes. The individual representing the candidate will not sit on the candidate forum panel.
- All candidates will make their presentation in a panel setting with a Moderator present.

### Ryan Zinke Steps Down as Secretary of the Interior

Interior Secretary Ryan Zinke has resigned after serving almost two years under the Trump Administration.

The U.S. Department of the Interior oversees the Bureau of Indian Affairs and the Bureau of Indian Education.

Zinke visited the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community in 2018. He toured the Way of Life Facility and met with tribal leaders from the four O'odham tribes.

# Stanley R. Liston, Founder of 'Shadow Wolves,' Walks On

Stanley R. Liston, known by many as "Shadow Man," has walked on.

Liston, who was born on the Tohono O'odham Nation and was a former member of the tribe's police department, founded "Shadow Wolves," a unique team recruited by the U.S. Customs Service in 1972 to help track drug smugglers crossing the border onto Tohono O'odham land.

His tracking skills became legendary and Customs officers called him "Shadow Man."

Shadow Wolves remains part of U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement.

# Cherokee Engineer Featured on 2019 Native American Coin

Mary Golda Ross, a Cherokee engineer, is featured on the 2019 Native American dollar coin in a design that celebrates Native peoples in the space program.

Ross was the first known Native American female engineer. She was one of 40 founding engineers at the highly secretive Skunk Works project at Lockheed Corporation, according to the Cherokee Phoenix newspaper. Ross died in 2008 at age 99.

The coin depicts Ross writing calculations, among other features. Native American athlete Jim Thorpe was on the 2018 Native American coin. Sacagawea remains on the front of the coin.

# \$3 Million Awarded to Tribal Business Communities

In December, the U.S. Department of Commerce's Minority Business Development Agency awarded more than \$3 million to support American Indian, Alaska Native and Native Hawaiianowned enterprises.

Ten enterprises received awards, including the American Indian Science and Engineering Society and United Tribes Technical College.

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

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# **2018 YEAR IN REVIEW**



Demolition of the old two-story Salt River Court House begins. The building first opened in the summer of 1992 and was replaced by the Judicial Center, which opened in 2017. The old court house started off with two courtrooms, a main courtroom and a juvenile courtroom. A third courtoom was later added.



The Great Wolf Lodge breaks ground in the Community. The 350-room family resort will include an 85,000-square-foot indoor water park and a 27,000-square-foot family entertainment center. The lodge will be the first in Arizona and is being built near Salt River Fields in the Talking Stick Entertainment District.



More than 200 people participate in the annual Walk for O'odham Piipaash in Lehi. The theme of walk was "Walking in Prayer for Our Past, Present and Future." Participants received a free T-shirt and a burrito breakfast after the walk.



Candace Lewis becomes the first person to earn any kind of postsecondary degree or certificate as an inmate of the Salt River Department of Corrections. Lewis earned a Certificate of Completion in Workforce Development through the Rio Salado Community College Reentry Program, a partnership made possible by the SRDOC and the Salt River Schools Higher Education Department. A small ceremony took place in the SRDOC to award Lewis her certificate.



The grand-opening ceremony for the prized Way of Life Facility (WOLF) is held, with a ribbon-cutting and other activities. The 119,000-square-foot, two-story WOLF features three full-size basketball courts, an indoor pool with a waterslide, a running track, a fitness center, a dining area, and classroom and office space. Outside, it features a unique skate park, a soccer field and a baseball field.



U.S Interior Secretary Ryan Zinke visits the Community and tours the Way of Life Facility. Zinke met with SRPMIC elected leaders and leaders from the O'odham sister tribes. He held a scheduled press briefing after meeting with tribal leaders to discuss the nation's opioid epidemic and how it's affecting Indian Country.







# SRPD Awarded \$70,000 for DUI Enforcement and Sustained Traffic Enforcement Programs

The Salt River Police Department (SRPD) was awarded a total of \$70,000 in grant funds from the Arizona Governor's Office of Highway Safety (AZ GOHS) in October. The grant awards will assist the Salt River Police Department (SRPD) in increasing its ability to detect impaired drivers and enforcement of traffic laws pertaining to aggressive driving, speeding, racing, distracted driving and red-light running. The Salt River Police Department will focus on increased Community awareness about the dangers of aggressive driving, distracted driving and impaired driving to reduce and prevent vehicle collisions.

The funding is distributed as follows:

- \$55,000 for DUI/Impaired Driving Enforcement. This grant will fund overtime pay to increase the number of officers on the roadways, enhancing impaired driving/DUI enforcement and education within the Community.
- \$15,000 for Sustained Traffic Enforcement Programs (STEP). This grant provides support for sustained traffic enforcement programs throughout the year. The traffic enforcement campaigns include speed enforcement, reckless driving, red-light running and DUI laws within the Community.

"The Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community and the Salt River Police Department are very appreciative of the Arizona Governor's Office of Highway Safety for selecting the SRPD to receive these grants," said SRPD Chief Karl G. Auerbach. "These grant awards will assist the SRPD to increase our operations to better serve and protect our Community."

The grant awards are reflective of the SRPD's commitment to improving roadway safety within the Community. The SRPD encourages everyone in the Community to do their part in making our roadways safe by diligently obeying traffic laws, not texting while driving, and driving safely.

helped with projects including the approval of several large commercial leases and lease amendments that benefit countless landowners such as OdySea, Medieval Times, Talking Stick parking lot, The Block and Expansion of Sierra Bloom; the implementation of the Cobell Land Buy-Back Program, which allowed the Community to purchase almost 195 acres of highfractionated land; implementations of new lease and regulations that provide clarity; and improving longneeded right-of-way for commercial and residential support. These were just a few of the many goals that Patton has helped the Community achieve.

"We have enjoyed our relationship with you over these past years," said Ray. "We appreciate the time you have spent here with us."

The Council presented Patton with a Pendleton blanket embroidered with his name and years he spent working at the BIA.

"I appreciate everything; this means a lot to me," said Patton. "Growing up, I was close to my grandpa and I learned lot of things from him. One of the things he always shared with me is that you shouldn't receive 'thank-yous' for things that you do; you should just do it because that's what you just do. 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
