Q&A: DEEDRA DALLAS

UNIVERSITY OF ARIZONA

Master's in Library and Information Science

Tell us about your educational background.
I recently received my Master's in Library and Information Science (MLIS) from the University of Arizona. Prior to this, I received my Bachelor of Science in Food and Nutrition Management from Arizona State University (2016). I attended Scottsdale Community College to complete my general studies before transferring to the university.

Describe your most rewarding college experience(s).
The friends and connections that I made during my MLIS program at the University of Arizona was a highlight for me. I had to push myself to connect with others, since my program was completely online, but I appreciated the group projects because they opened doors for me to get to know others in my field/program. One of my top highlights was completing my Master's program with a 4.0. I struggled academically in high school and I failed a lot in my undergrad program, so to graduate with my MLIS with all A's showed me that I can push myself to succeed and go for something if I really want it for myself. My past failures pushed me to succeed.

What are your future plans?
Connecting others to information and personnel services has become a passion and a highlight for me in the beginning stages of my career in the Library and Information Science field. I look forward to opportunities that will help me excel in positions serving individuals through information services. One of my main career goals is to use my education to serve Native American communities. Whether serving my community in Salt River or on the Hopi reservation, I hope to use my education and experience advocating for access to information and technology for Native American individuals. I am committed to working toward building diverse and inclusive library and information environments for Native populations throughout my career. The thought of all of this is exciting!

What do you hope to accomplish in the next 10 years?
I've recognized that on rural Native American reservations, there is a lack of information and communication technology services. I realize that this economic downfall has an impact on access to justice, public health and government services, and education and employment opportunities. In the next 10 years, I want to use my education and knowledge to advocate for change in these areas.

Who or what influenced you to pursue your higher education?
My parents both influenced me to get an education, along with my brother. I saw the opportunities that opened up for them after pursuing their education. I also realized that achievement in higher education among Native populations is lower than the national average. After realizing this and wanting to make change, I told myself this change begins with me.

Did you face any obstacles while attending college/university? If so, how did you overcome them?
When I graduated from high school, my GPA was so low that I had to start from the very bottom when I enrolled for courses at Scottsdale Community College. I



spent many hours in the tutoring center, and I enrolled in a math tutoring course so that I could pass my math courses. I failed courses and had to take them over, but I kept pushing myself to succeed. My hardships and challenges in my undergraduate studies shaped my focus and determination that helped me get through graduate school. When I got into my graduate courses, I had to push myself to open up and share with my graduate peers. Graduate school at times was lonely and awkward since I did not have many Native American peers, and in some courses I was the only Native student. I had to learn when to speak up and when it was okay to stay silent and listen. Learning about the disparities in access to library and information services among diverse populations was a hard pill to swallow, but it helped shape my career goals.

What advice would you give people considering higher education?
Be graceful with yourself and learn new subjects while in school. It is okay to fail, failure is normal, but get back up and try again and ask for help when you need it. I failed chemistry in my undergrad program three times. The fourth time, I passed the course at the top of my class. You just have to keep trying. Also, when it comes to your educational and career goals, remember yourself overall. Yes, definitely pursue your higher educational and career goals, but don't lose yourself in the process.

Is there anyone you would like to thank for their support as you pursued your education?
I am thankful for my dad, who passed on some years ago. I know he would be excited and proud of how far I've come. I am also thankful for my mom, Laverne Dallas, and my brother, Stephen Dallas. Without them, I don't know where I would be today. I love them so much, as they are the foundation and support that hold me up when I fall and push me to keep going when I feel doubtful. Thank you also to my professors at the University of Arizona during my MLIS graduate program and my advisor at the Salt River Higher Education Office, Mario West. Finally, a shoutout to the University of Arizona for putting together an MLIS program that addresses marginalized and underserved communities within the library and information field. This definitely needed much highlight and change

Q&A: DARREN HARRIS

ARIZONA STATE UNIVERSITY

Bachelor of Science in Environmental Design

Tell us about your educational background.
I received my Associate of Applied Science from the Art Institute of Phoenix back in 1997. In 2010, I went to Gateway Community College for Office Technology. I received my Associate in Applied Science in Motion Pictures at Scottsdale School of Film and Theatre in 2016. Then in 2017, I received a Certificate of Completion in editing at Scottsdale School of Film and Theatre. I went to Arizona State University for an undergraduate degree in Environmental Design and graduated on May 9, 2022.

Describe your most rewarding college experience(s).
The only thing I can say is that I was able to attend college about 20-something years since I was in high school. Some of the conversations I sat in are things I would not talk about, but I am glad to have had that experience.

What are your future plans?
I plan to keep working for the Community. I like what I do here in the Information Technology department, making videos for the Community on governmental departments and anything culturally on Community members.

What do you hope to accomplish in the next 10 years?
I hope to learn in a supervisory position and maybe receive my master's in communications from Arizona State University.

Who or what influenced you to pursue your higher education?
No one went to college in my immediate family; everyone started to work for their families. Getting a higher education was something I wanted to do for myself. I also wanted to get paid more in my current position. I like to learn new things that can help me out daily.

Did you face any obstacles while attending college/university? If so, how did you overcome them?
The only obstacle I faced attending ASU was time. In 2017, I tried to go for the Graphic Design program, but I didn't get into the program for my first year, so I had to pick another major. I decided on Environmental Design. That put me a year behind. Then in August 2019, two days before the fall semester started at ASU, I was unable to stand on my right foot for about two hours after work that day. I had a doctor's appointment at the old clinic in Salt River the next day. The doctor told me what was wrong with my foot, but unfortunately they didn't have the technology to help me. I needed to go to the



nearest emergency room or go to Phoenix Indian Medical Center. In the end, I was diagnosed with bone deformation, and my right ankle will never be the same. I had to learn how to walk again and take that semester off. There were some challenges working with Salt River Higher Education because of the number of semesters it took me to graduate, but in the end, it all worked out okay.

What advice would you give people considering higher education?
I say do it for yourself. Do what I did and strive to understand the classes you are taking. Set high personal and academic goals and aim for them. Show up for class, study and work hard so you can accomplish your higher education goals. Don't be afraid to ask questions, even if you ask another student who may have a better understanding of the subject and can explain it better to you. If you have doubt, remind yourself that you can do this. Like my mom would say, "You can do it because you are O'odham."

Is there anyone you would like to thank for their support as you pursued your education?
I want to thank Mary Garcia and Dee Dee (Diane Cashoya) for their support on my higher education journey. Those two were the ones who told me I could do it initially when I was thinking about getting my Bachelor's in Graphic Design; unfortunately, that didn't happen. It was meant for me to get a Bachelor of Science in Environmental Design. I also want to thank my mom. Although she is not here physically to see me graduate, I know she was there spiritually.

Tell us about your educational background.
In 2012, I started the [SRPMIC] Apprenticeship Program for hotel management. I also interned at Talking Stick Resort, completing 2,000 hours of on-the-job training. I worked as a housekeeper, phone operator, hostess for Orange Sky Restaurant and Wandering Horse Buffet, cashier for Black Fig Bistro, room service runner, and as a locker attendant and front desk receptionist for the spa. In 2014, I received my Apprenticeship Certificate for Hotel Management. I was permanently hired at Talking Stick Resort in the spa department, and in 2020 I was promoted to Guest Services Lead for the spa.

Describe your most rewarding college experience(s).
My most rewarding college experience was graduating. That feeling of accomplishment has made me a stronger person!

What are your future plans?
Next, I plan to focus on family! So much of my time has been dedicated to work and homework, leaving no time to really just sit and visit with family. I am looking forward to connecting with my family!

Professional Science Master’s in
Applied Nutrition

Tell us about your educational background.
In 2006, I received my Associate of Occupational Studies from Le Cordon Bleu in Scottsdale. In 2018, I received my second associate degree (Associate of Arts) from Scottsdale Community College before earning my Bachelor of Science in Nutrition (December 2020) from Arizona State University. Currently, I am attending the University of Arizona for my Professional Science Master’s in Applied Nutrition (with an emphasis in Health and Wellness), which will be completed in three more months! I am also working part-time with the [SRPMIC] Diabetes Education Program, where I must implement a program in order to fulfill my Capstone project for graduate school.

Describe your most rewarding college experience(s).
I work very hard trying to balance my schoolwork, mental health, physical health and family life, so every “A” I receive gives me a sense of pride because it shows me that almost anything is possible with hard work and diligence. So far, I’ve graduated with high distinction from SCC and summa cum laude from ASU, and I currently have a 4.0 in graduate school.

What are your future plans?
A month ago, I was one of two applicants accepted for the Southwestern Dietetic Internship, which will take place in August at Phoenix Indian Medical Center along with a two-week rotation in Pinon on the Navajo Nation. Every registered dietitian-to-be must complete an accredited internship of 1,200 hours before taking the national RD examination to receive the credentials. I am excited that this internship will provide me with the experience of working with the Indigenous population so that I may better assist our Community, since my future goal is to work as a registered dietitian for our tribe.

What do you hope to accomplish in the next 10 years?
I would like to be working for our Community as an RD, become a Certified Diabetes Care and Education Specialist (CDCES) and help my husband pay off our mortgage.

Who or what influenced you to pursue your higher education?
I wanted to do something that would benefit the lives of other people. I was a blackjack dealer for four years when I decided that that occupation was not something that brought me fulfillment. I started thinking, Well, what would make me happy? What is needed in the world? Helping my community in bettering their health was the answer, especially since my mom had passed away from complications due to diabetes the year prior.

Did you face any obstacles while attending college/university? If so, how did you overcome them?
When I started my first semester of college, I was working part-time and had an 18-month-old and then



another baby a year and half later. Balancing my babies and school was my toughest obstacle. It was important to me to be a present mother. To achieve this, I attended college part-time. Although it has taken me seven years of schooling to receive my bachelor’s and (soon) master’s degrees, it was worth spreading out my courses, because it gave me more time to understand the material (in order to get the best grades) and I was able to thoroughly enjoy watching my babies grow. They will be 9 and 6 this summer!

What advice would you give people considering higher education?
I was so scared of attending college because I didn’t think I was smart enough. It turns out you don’t have to be super smart; you just have to work super hard, be organized and stay (mostly) focused. Keep telling yourself you can and do your best to make your mental health a priority. Our minds are a powerful tool to help us achieve what we want in life, so take care of it.

Is there anyone you would like to thank for their support as you pursued your education?
My husband has been my cheerleader and main source of support through these past seven years of college. He’s always there to boost my morale and lend an ear when I need to vent. Thank you, babe, for nurturing my soul when I faced uncertainty and for putting up with my mood swings! Another person I would like to acknowledge is my cousin Girssy (Denelle Prieto). She was the first of the cousins to go to college and has inspired me to do the same. Many times, I thought, If she can do it, I can too. Some days, that was all I needed to push through.

Describe your most rewarding college experience(s).
The most rewarding is telling other people that they, too, can achieve certificates and degrees.

What are your future plans?
I have just taken my nurse entrance exam and got accepted to the Arizona College of Nursing. I start on June 27. I will be obtaining my Bachelor of Science in Nursing in 2024.

What do you hope to accomplish in the next 10 years?
I will be working as a nurse in a hospital or clinic, preferably in Salt River, working toward my Master’s in Nursing. I also hope to be traveling the world and having new adventures.

Who or what influenced you to pursue your higher education?
My Aunt Victoria Makil was an LPN, and I always wanted to be a nurse like her. Thank you, Auntie. I know you see me from heaven.

Did you face any obstacles while attending college/university? If so, how did you overcome them?
In my fourth session, I contracted COVID-19. When I finally went to the hospital to receive an IV treatment, the doctor said I could not receive the treatment because my oxygen level was too low. They immediately took me to the emergency room. I was put on regular oxygen and admitted. I spent one day on a regular floor, and then the next day they moved me to the intensive care unit. My oxygen was not improving, but in fact getting worse. The doctor put me on high-flow oxygen, and then my oxygen level was finally holding steady and improving. Two weeks later I was moved out of ICU, and one week later I was released. During this time my mother was also admitted to the hospital for COVID-19, and thankfully she was released within two weeks. I am extremely grateful for our recovery.

What advice would you give people considering higher education?
You can do it! Just try and try again.

Is there anyone you would like to thank for their support as you pursued your education?
I thank God first and foremost, and a great thank-you from my heart to my wonderful, beautiful mother, Sandra Lee Ybarra, for all her infinite love, care, time, effort and discipline. Without you, Mom, I could not make it. I hope I make you happy and proud. I love you more than anything in the world. I would also like to thank my sisters, Marie and Marla; my nephews, Zach and Marcelino; and all my loved ones who listened and helped in any way and pushed me to finish and continue.

Tell us about your educational background.
After graduating in 2006 from Mesa Mountain View High School, I met my husband on a study abroad program to Australia, where we shared our culture with the Indigenous people of the Australian Outback, the Aboriginal people. From there I both attended school and worked full-time thanks to Casino Arizona’s education program for Community members. I finished two degrees from Scottsdale Community College in the past seven years, and I am very interested in learning more about business and business management. I will be transferring to Arizona State University, where I hope to be accepted into the W.P. Carey School of Business.

Describe your most rewarding college experience(s).
My most rewarding experiences have always been right before graduation, when I always learned the most about myself. In 2015, during the last two months of the semester, I had my third son right before finals and graduation. With a brand-new baby, I had to figure out how to pass all my classes in order to graduate. It was a super-tough semester, but luckily I graduated with my AA degree. My current graduation experience for 2022 was very rewarding and by far the most difficult. I had two accounting courses back-to-back, an online Calculus 3 class, and a statistics class that I had to pass with a C or better. I was

afraid I would not pass my calculus class—not that it was too hard, but I had to learn how to manage my time in order to study for each class. I felt like I did not have enough time in the day to finish my assignments. The reward came when I got to graduate and feel the relief of completing a difficult task that took many years.

What are your future plans?
I plan on attending ASU’s W.P. Carey School of Business and graduating a few years down the road.

What do you hope to accomplish in the next 10 years?
I would like to finish paying off my house and find a job that I love at the [SRPMIC] where I can use my strengths to help others or challenge myself again.

Who or what influenced you to pursue your higher education?
My parents are my biggest influencers. I dedicated my semester and graduation to my late father, Robert Lee Scabby, who passed away in 2020. He wanted me to always finish what I started. He helped tutor me during my 2020 school semester when the schools shut down during the pandemic. He was able to see me complete another tough semester before he passed. He would “lovingly” get after me to keep going and encouraged me to think critically. He wanted me to be strong in math and improve my overall mental capabilities. He would tell us to “be mentally strong, don’t quit, and always finish strong even if you feel weak.” My other great influences are my grandparents, Paul and Beverly

Smith. I am named after my great-grandma Ida, and everyone always tells me that she devoted all of her time and career to the tribe’s Education programs. This includes my grandma Beverly, as she also worked in education. So, I guess you can say I wanted to live up to my namesake. I also personally wanted to go to school, because so many trailblazers have paved the way for us. Without them dedicating their lives to provide the aid and programs that we have now, we wouldn’t have these educational opportunities so readily available.

Did you face any obstacles while attending college/university? If so, how did you overcome them?
The hardest part of my final semester was time management and prioritizing. All my classes demanded the same amount of time and energy, so I had to decide which ones I would focus on and which would have to wait. It was a constant battle to keep my life in balance. I would spend the morning on math, the afternoon on accounting, and the evening on stats. All this included my normal work schedule too. I would study at work when it was slow. Studying for the exams was my biggest obstacle during the semester.

What advice would you give people considering higher education?
