The "eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month" of 1918 signaled the end of World War I, otherwise known as Armistice Day. In 1926, Congress passed a resolution for an annual observance to honor and thank all military personnel who served the United States honorably during war or peacetime, and in 1938 it would become a national holiday. Later in 1954, President Dwight D. Eisenhower would change the name of the holiday from Armistice Day to Veterans Day.

On this Veterans Day, let us not forget the services of the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community veterans past and present who served our great country and represented our Community. In the following pages you will see more than 450 O'odham and Piipaash men and women who served alongside their brothers and sisters from other tribal nations.

We honor and thank all veterans past, present and future who have proudly served and sacrificed for our country.

To these brave and selfless individuals, who had to leave our homelands and travel far away to protect our freedom and country, we owe a debt of gratitude. We also need to thank their families for the sacrifices they too made.

When the late World War II veteran Lester Manuel returned home, he got off the train in Mesa with his duffel bag and began walking home. A motorist stopped and asked him if he wanted a ride. Lester said no. He explained that it felt good to have the (Community) dirt beneath his feet and the joy he felt seeing all the cottonwood trees along the river and in the fields.

Some Community soldiers were wounded, physically or mentally, while others did not make it home. Let us not forget.

Each year the names of all our veterans will be read during the Veterans Day roll call as a reminder of what they did for our country and Community.

I encourage you to take a moment and visit with our veterans, even if it is just to shake their hand and say, "Thank you for your service."

The Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community is eternally grateful for each soldier's courage and the sacrifice they made to preserve and protect our country's values and freedom.

Please join us on November 11 at 9 a.m., when the Community will honor our SRP-MIC veterans at the Two Waters Complex.

VETERAN PROFILE: ROBERT “BOB” CHIAGO

There are some dark days you experience firsthand that you can’t forget.

For Vietnam War veteran and Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community member Robert “Bob” Chiago, there are at least two: September 11, 1967, and October 13, 1967.

Chiago served in the U.S. Marine Corps from March 1965 to November 1968. His tour in Vietnam lasted 13 months, from June 1967 to July 1968.

Chiago was 22 and a senior at Arizona State University when he wanted to join the Corps’ officer candidate program. He wanted to follow in his father’s footsteps. Chiago’s dad, Clarence, was a Marine and received a Bronze Star in World War II. His brothers, Johnny, Harrison and Lloyd, also served in the military. Chiago’s cousins, one of them Navajo, served in the Korean War, and another cousin was a Navajo Code Talker. He said his great-grandfather served in the Civil War.

Chiago graduated from ASU in February, 1965 and was in Quantico, Virginia, not long after to start school in March. After training, he was sent to Guantanamo Bay Naval Base for six months with the 1st Battalion, 2nd Marines as a platoon infantry officer and platoon commander.

Next, Chiago was sent to North Carolina before heading to California for language school at the Defense Language Institute in Monterey, where he learned Vietnamese.

In June 1967, Chiago was sent to the Vietnam War. He saved a newspaper clipping from the Navy Times, August 1967 (*see newspaper clipping on right*). The article, titled “Marines Force Cong To Try Psychology,” quotes Lt. Chiago as commanding officer of a combined action company.

Chiago was part of the 1st Battalion, 9th Marines and was responsible for five platoons working alongside with the South Vietnamese Popular Force, a local militia living in villages.

“Our mission essentially was to try to win the hearts and minds of the people,” Chiago said. “We served with them; we had civic action type of programs like helping them dig wells and providing some low-level medical services for them.”

On September 11, 1967, one of Chiago’s platoons was overrun and five soldiers were killed in one night. “I knew all of them,” he said. During the 9/11 memorial each year, Chiago can’t help but remember those five soldiers from that platoon who fell on another September 11 more than 50 years ago.

In October 1967, Chiago was stationed in Con Thien, a U.S. Marines combat base near Quang Tri on the fringes of the Vietnamese Demilitarized Zone, a dividing line between North and South Vietnam. Here, on Friday, October 13, 1967, a controlled U.S. air strike was called in; the bombs fell short and were accidentally dropped inside the battalion perimeter, resulting in two U.S. servicemen killed and 17 wounded



by friendly fire.

The bomb concussion destroyed bunkers. Chiago’s bunker was one of the lucky ones. “All of a sudden things shook—it felt like flash can in the whole bunker,” he said.

Chiago supervised evacuations and assigned soldiers to watch the perimeter for the enemy.

His time in Con Thien was part of Operation Kingfisher, which was carried out from July 16 to October 31, 1967. In the operation, 340 people died and 1,461 were wounded.

Chiago took part in other missions in Vietnam before heading back home. He went on to have a career in education in a variety of roles that took him to multiple states in the Southwest, including time with the Education Department of Salt River.

Anyone interested in joining the military should do some research first, Chiago offered. “Get on the

Internet and do some research on which [military] branch [you’d like to join], meet those qualifications and join. It’s a good opportunity. I learned more when I was in the Marine Corps than [I did in] college or anywhere else. You have to be persistent and continue to get after it.”

Marines Force Cong To Try Psychology

PHU BAI Vietnam—“Maybe it’s a little frightening but it’s just one more way of measuring our progress and the effectiveness of our program.”

Lt. Robert K. Chiago commanding officer of a Combined Action Company summarized a recent psychological barrage directed by the Viet Cong at the company in the hamlet of Thuy Phuong.

For several nights recently VC loudspeakers have been telling the people to leave the area. The broadcast messages also tell the

Vietnamese Popular Forces troops serving with the CAC unit that they will be granted safe passage if they leave, but warned that all Marines would be killed.

“We must be a thorn in their side,” Chiago said.

“Why else would they bother to go to all this trouble? Now it becomes a matter of saving face. The Viet Cong have told the people they are going to get rid of us and now they must try.”

Thuy Phuong was a hotbed of Viet Cong activity when the CAC unit moved into the area in the spring of 1966.

“Not only did the Viet Cong say they would kill all the Marines in the company but they also began to threaten the people, warning them they would burn their homes if they cooperated with the Marines,” Chiago said.

“It may be a little backhanded but this is another sure way to gauge our progress.”

The ceremony marked changes in three submarine divisions— Sub Div 71, Sub Div 72 and Sub Div 73.

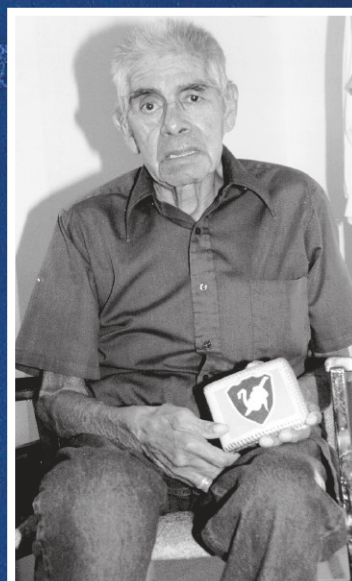

VETERAN PROFILE: CORWIN SMITH

SRPMIC Member Corwin “Shimmy” Smith’s Army Experience

Salt River Pima-Mari-copa Indian Community member Corwin “Shimmy” Smith sat down with *O’odham Action News* to share his experiences in the United States Army in the 1980s, which included everything from basic training to a somewhat perilous flight across the Atlantic.

Smith, a family man who grew up in San Carlos, but lives in Whiteriver with his family, and works as an environmental specialist with the SRPMIC Environmental Protection and Natural Resources division. He is the son of McKenzie Smith (San Carlos Apache) and Marlene Andrews Smith (SRP-MIC). He and his five siblings grew up on the San Carlos Apache Reservation. They would spend each August, before school started, in Salt River with their grandparents the late Michael (WWII veteran) and Ella Andrews. Smith graduated from East Fork Lutheran High School and went on to higher education, but college was not the right fit for him at the time and he decided to join the army.

“At first, there was no way I was ever going to join the military, but things change,” Smith said. “There were no jobs back in the early ‘80s, and I tried college but it didn’t work for me. My cousin kicked the idea around that we should join the military, our first choice was to join the Air Force, but the nearest recruiter was in Phoenix, so we decided to join the Army. I talked to my uncle Meldon Andrews, who was in the Marines, who directed me to my uncle Brian Lewis who was in the Army, and he gave me some advice and told me what to expect if I joined. He told me to pick a job trade that was compatible with civilian life, that I could use when I got out.”

In the Army Now

At age 21, Smith went for basic training at Fort Jackson, South Carolina, and after basic training he headed to Advanced Individual Training at Fort Gordon, Georgia, to train as a wire systems installer/operator.

Smith’s military relatives emphasized that “you had to be in shape because

there was going to be a lot of running every day in basic training. You’re scared because the drill instructors are always yelling, you’re lonely because you miss home. I was thinking, ‘What have I gotten myself into? What am I doing here?’ You have to realize that we’re all in the same boat, we’re all in this together, so you get to know each other. They stress the buddy system, where you help each other out.”

After his training in Georgia, Smith was stationed at Fort Riley, Kansas (1983-1987), home of the 1st Infantry Division, also known as the Big Red One. He spent the rest of his four years there, but he did get the opportunity once to go to Germany for a training exercise that lasted a month.

Smith really enjoyed being in Germany. “This was my first experience going to a foreign country by myself,” he said. “I liked it a lot—it had all the little towns and the countryside was really green. I wished I was stationed there; it was nice there and you could experience four seasons in one day.

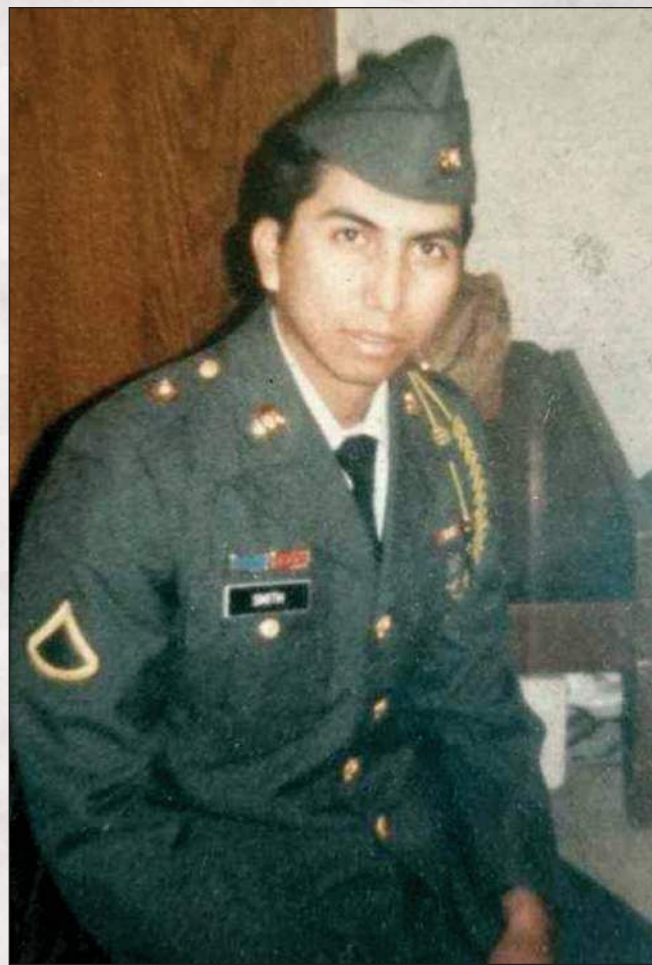
“We took a tour there. I went to Munich where the [1972] Olympic Stadium was, but we didn’t get to go in because we didn’t have any German money. So, we walked throughout the Olympic Village. I would like to go back there someday.”

On his return home from Germany, Smith and his group expected to fly straight to Kansas, but their plane stopped in New Jersey and they had to spend the night. The men wondered why. Later it was revealed that the plane’s engines had gone out while flying over the Atlantic Ocean and needed to be repaired. To this day Smith will not fly over the ocean.

After the Military

Smith was fortunate not to experience any time in war. He learned the trade of telecommunications, running telephone lines and cables on the bases where he was stationed. When he left the Army, he worked with the Bureau of Indian Affairs in forestry for 17 years and then moved on to his job with the SRPMIC.

“It was a relief to get out of the Army,” he said. “I and this other guy



from New York got out the same day. He came knocking on my door at midnight and said, ‘Smitty, let’s go!’ We went and signed our discharged papers.

“At first, I was glad I was in the Army, but after a couple of years I wanted to go to another base. The last two years were horrible because the new sergeants would abuse their authority and favoritism was going on. It changed my view of [the military], and I wanted to get out. After my Expiration of Term of Service (ETS) date, I flew back to Phoenix, got on a bus from there to San Carlos. I only had bus fare to Globe, but they let me ride to Peridot for free. It was dark when I got off by the rodeo grounds, I walked home from there and surprised my family.”

After his time in the Army, Smith married his wife of 31 years Margaret Smith (White Mountain Apache) and had a son and two daughters, Weston, Tashina and Janelle. He has one granddaughter, Kylee, and they enjoy watching Professional Bull Riders (PBR) events together. Smith also likes to find new music, and he is a big fan of reggae music.

Advice

Smith still highly recommends the military. “If whatever you’re pursuing early in life doesn’t work

out, like college or trade school, don’t sit around and waste your time; go join the military. You can think about what you want to do while you’re in there, and when you get out you can pursue that,” he said. “You’re still young, and it’s only three or four years out of your life.

“It’s hard to leave home, especially when you’re from the reservation, because you get homesick. But when you come back the reservation is always going to be there. Think about yourself and what you want to do. There are benefits when you get out, and you can get a house or an education.”

masters Post 114. Guests from veterans' organizations led a number of talks about helping veterans to get medical attention and other services they may need.

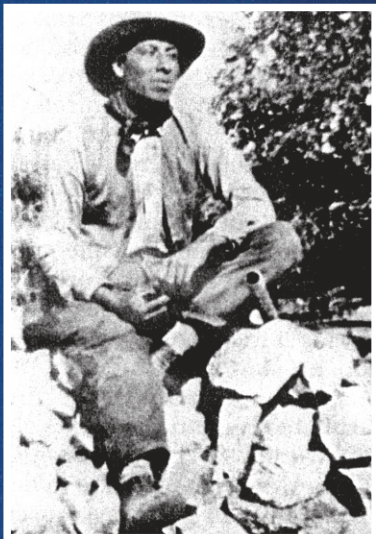
