EARNING HIS SPURS: JACOB CHARLIE TALKS BASIC TRAINING

How was your Army Basic Training, and where did you complete it? I attended OSUT at Ft Moore Georgia for 22 weeks. It was a great experience, tough at times but necessary for transitioning from civilian to soldier.

What has been the most challenging aspect of your Basic Combat Training, and where did you undergo your Advanced Individual Training? The hardest thing about OSUT is the initial transition and letting go of all your simple freedoms but once adapted it becomes normal. Combat MOS's do not move to a new location for AIT.

Where are you currently stationed? Have you made any new acquaintances or connections within your unit? Currently I'm stationed at Ft Bliss In El Paso TX. The guys I work with can be described as my new family rather than acquaintances. We all fight and suffer together.

What unexpected skills have you acquired during your training? Being able to operate under intense stress and little to no sleep.

How are you adapting to the military lifestyle and its routines? I'm adapting well, everything constantly changes as far as daily tasks and trainings, adaptability is key to a good military career.

What are you most excited about regarding your upcoming assignments? In December my brigade will be on a 9 month Rotation to Poland.

How have you been staying connected with family and friends back home? I come home to visit with my family every chance I get and I keep in touch whether it be by phone call or text message.

Have you had any interesting or memorable experiences to share with SRPMIC? Other than my training in Georgia, I have been to Fort Irwin California to partake in a Brigade wide combat training that lasted 3 weeks in a field environment, and 2 weeks in services for vehicle maintenance. Out of 45 soldiers in my company, me and buddy were the only two to be chosen to Attempt in a Calvary Spur Ride. The Spur ride lasted 3 days and consisted of over 30 miles of rucking with 50lbs, weapons lanes, land navigation, and maneuvering tactics, all while singing The Fiddlers Green. Me and my buddy were awarded our Calvary Spurs.

Now that you've had some time to reflect, how do you feel about your decision to join the military? Joining when I did was the right decision, being able to develop life and job skills prior to the army has helped me greatly. Being able to serve my country is my greatest achievement thus far in my life and I wouldn't have chose differently.

What are your goals or aspirations within the military? Make my way through the ranks and continue to apply myself to the Army standard.

Finally, what advice can you offer to a community member who is considering joining the military? Join with an open mind, no matter what Job you choose in the army you will be tested physically and mentally, but you will grow and mature and others will notice.

Honoring Sacrifice and Service

As Veterans Day approaches, we pause to reflect on the sacrifices and contributions of all service members and their families. We acknowledge that many veterans have dedicated significant to continue supporting these families. We show ap- improved roadways, better drainage and, most preciation by improving the veterans' areas in our cemeteries to honor their service with meaningful memorials.

The Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community is ready to begin improvements at the Lehi Cemetery and Veterans Memorial, starting with earth-moving equipment on site. This is the first step in expanding the cemetery to better serve our veterans and future generations. Due to the

sensitive nature of the land, especially regarding potential discovery of artifacts, an archaeological monitor will be present full-time during the first eight to 10 weeks of earthwork and utility installation. This ensures that any significant findings are handled with care, preserving our history while making necessary improvements.

The utility upgrades will enhance operations at Lehi Cemetery and support the expansion of burial time away from their loved ones, and it's important space. These upgrades will include new hose bibs, importantly, an increase in burial space to serve

> Once earthwork and utilities are completed, construction on the Lehi Veterans Memorial will begin. An engineered foundation will be laid to support structures that will serve as spaces for reflection, remembrance and education. This memorial will offer a dedicated place for Community members and visitors to honor the service and

sacrifices of those who served in the military. It's a space that ensures future generations understand the legacy of Community veterans.

Simultaneously, the Salt River Cemetery and Veterans Memorial are in the planning and design stage. This concept has been developed with careful attention to burial space, walking paths, accessible parking, roadways, improved drainage and a designated memorial area for Salt River veterans. However, before final designs can move forward, an Environmental and Archaeological testing plan will be implemented by the SRPMIC Environmental Protection and Natural Resources (EPNR) department. Testing is scheduled to begin in early 2025. This phase is critical in preserving the natural and historical integrity of the land before construction begins.

Creating both of these memorials has been a collaborative process involving input from veterans, SRPMIC Engineering and Construction Services (ECS), Public Works and Community members. These memorials are more than just structures—they're symbols of honor, celebration and the ongoing support for veterans within the Community. They are reminders of our veterans' resilience, bravery and commitment, as well as the support and resources available through the Veterans Representatives and regular meetings with Community veterans groups.

As we approach Veterans Day, we remember not just our veterans' service but also their families' sacrifices. Let us honor their legacy in November and throughout the year by ensuring they receive the respect and support they deserve. The improvements to the veterans memorials and cemeteries show our appreciation and continue the tradition of honoring those who have served.

These improvements are critical in providing a respectful and enduring space for reflection, and we are committed to completing them with care, ensuring that our veterans and their families are honored in a meaningful way.

U.S. ARMY (OPERATION DESERT STORM)


In April 1988, Edward "Pacer" Reina, III joined the U.S. Army a month before he graduated from high school. After basic training, Reina went to Airborne School and jumped out of planes dozens of times.

"When that chute opens up and I'm floating down, it's the most peaceful thing in the world. Flight has always fascinated me, and having that ability is like you're walking on clouds," Reina said.


He served with the Charlie Company, Second Battalion, 505th Parachute Infantry Regiment, 3rd Brigade, 82nd Airborne Division. He spent time in Egypt, Saudi Arabia and Iraq.

Reina returned home in 1992 after being honorably discharged.

"Now I think about everything, life in general, I find that there are still peaks and valleys and everyone has their highs and lows. But that mental



toughness I developed at Airborne school and later on with the 82nd Airborne Division and going into a combat zone helped me overcome the challenges," he said.

DELBERT W. RAY SR.

U.S.M.C. (VIETNAM)



Former Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community President Delbert W. Ray Sr. enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps in April 1969, when he was 21.

"I joined the Marine Corps because I wanted to do more with my life," he said.

"[My skill] was in the area of engineering, so I was a heavy equipment mechanic/operator," Ray said. "We did a lot of taking equipment apart and replacing parts. That was my military occupation specialty for three years. This is also what I did when I was stationed in Vietnam."

When his unit arrived in Vietnam, they were vulnerable.

"When you land, you have no weapons and there [were] bombings all on the way, and it finally dawned on me that this stuff is real," Ray said.

Ray's job during the war was putting landing zones together for helicopters. "When we were there, we were out on the field a lot ... so we were out in the bush a lot, which was located in central Vietnam," he said.

Ray noted that he was actually in the war at the same time as his brother, Jonah. "He was in the northern part and I was in the central part," he said.

"I am just thankful I am alive," said Ray. "I think the worst part of the whole Vietnam thing was coming back home, which was around the same time as the [Vietnam War protests] were happening. We were all happy to be home; [but] then [we were] getting off the plane, having people yelling at us, being ungrateful and not knowing what took place. I still have bad feelings about that time....

Ray finished his tour of duty in April 1972.

BURLEIGH SAUNDERS

U.S. ARMY SF (VIETNAM)



In the late 1950s, at age 17, Burleigh Saunders made the decision to willingly join the military rather than waiting to be

"I knew if I were drafted they would put me in a line company, a straight-leg infantry," said Saunders about why he enlisted. "I didn't want that. If I enlisted, I would have my choice of duty station."

Saunders attended Army basic training at Fort Benning, Georgia as well as Jump School and Ranger School. He later moved to Fort Bragg in North Carolina for Special Forces train-

Saunders eventually was sent to Vietnam, assigned to the U.S. Military Assistance Advisory Group (MAAG), where he helped the Army of the Republic of Vietnam (ARVN) train in tactics. He did two and a half tours there.

Saunders' specialty was demolitions; he was called on to clear pathways for helicopters to drop off equipment and sup-

When he was discharged, Saunders ended up at Travis Air Force Base in Solano, California.

"I just thought 'home, home, home, home, " said Saunders about his long journey back to the United States. When he was in California, Vietnam soldiers were advised not to wear their uniforms outside the gates of the base. Saunders wondered why. They did not realize how strong the anti-Vietnam War protests had become in this country.

"I was proud to wear [my uniform]," he said.

After another long journey, Saunders finally made it back to Phoenix. When he arrived, he cried and hugged his parents and told them he missed them.

"We were only doing what we were supposed to do," said Saunders. "But I was always glad to get home. I don't care where you go, there is no place like home."

U.S. NAVY (KOREA) IT IS A GOOD THING, BUT IT IS HARD ON THE FAMILY

The Korean War was termed "The Forgotten War" because it took place between World War II and the Vietnam War, with little media coverage. The Korean War officially took place from June 1950 to July 1953. There never was a formal declaration of war by Congress, nor was there a treaty or an official end to the war. Because of these facts, the Korean War is referred to as a "police action" or a "conflict."

Schurz recalled, "My time in Korea including [sailing] up and down the east coast of Korea, bombing different places."

He spoke of different experiences with his fellow sailors, many of them funny and joyful, that helped build unity among them. When he reflected on his service time, it includes thoughts about his own family, a wife and two small children at the time, who were foremost on his mind. He said, "It is a good thing, but it is hard on the family. Soldiers leave ... you have to leave your family."

He added, "When I was in the war, I thought about my two boys, how they were going to be without me [if I did not come back]. I thought about this a lot."

Lastly, he offered, "If you go into the military, you are going [in] to protect your Community; you are like a warrior."





Rhoades left for home June 18, 1945, traveling through the Panama Canal to New Port Richey, Florida, followed by a train ride across the U.S. to Fort MacArthur, California, where he was discharged. He then caught a bus from Los Angeles to Phoenix, arriving home August 31, 1945. He said, "After arriving home, there was no Community celebration—nothing."


Rhoades took advantage of the G.I. Bill, training as a truck mechanic. When asked if he would do



After attending the Phoenix Indian School for eight years, in 1937 Harrison Rhoades joined the Army National Guard along with his brother Everett. They were sent to bases in Texas and Oklahoma, and back to Texas for maneuvers.

When Pearl Harbor was attacked by Japanese planes on December 7, 1941, "The Japanese made a sneak attack on American ships; they sunk the USS Arizona, which was the largest ship there," Rhoades said. "During that time I was stationed with the Army's 45th Infantry Division in Louisiana, where we were doing jungle-type training." He would later become part of the 158th Infantry Regiment and be sent along with his brother to protect the Panama

In 1943, Rhoades was stationed with the 158th in Brisbane, Australia, for six months; they then went to New Guinea and saw combat with the Japanese.

During this time, Rhoades had his brother Everett with him, explained Rhoades' daughter, Pauline Antone. The brothers were together in the same regiment fighting side by side during those five years, and they came back home

GREGORY VINCENT


U.S. ARMY (VIETNAM, GULF WAR, GRANADA, AND PANAMA)

As a young boy, Gregory Vincent said he was bound for the military. "Growing up as a kid I was always playing with toy soldiers, model planes and ships, and watched every war movie possible," he said. He was assigned to the 55th Aviation

Company, U.S. 8th Army. This is where Vincent would find his Army career, learning how to repair radios on helicopters and other Army aircraft. He said, "The pilot will have to rely on this instrument. I repaired that radio to been seen by radar, and that was my job." He was assigned to 35/20 avionics, navigation and flight control repairman jobs.

Vincent had been in the aviation club in

high school, so it was no surprise to him that he would be working with helicopters. He earned an honorable discharge after serving 20 years in the U.S. Army. After his discharge, he returned to Salt River.
