Every year, it is important to celebrate and thank those brave individuals who have served their country.

On Friday, Nov. 7, a few days before the Veterans Day holiday, in the Two Waters Courtyard, the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community held a Veterans Day celebration to honor Community members and staff who have served in the U.S. military. This year, both Community veterans and employee veterans were honored at the same event.

"As you know, in Indian Country, veterans, or warriors, have always been a part of our Community," began event emcee Pacer Reina. "We've always recognized the men and women that stood up to defend our homes and Community. For the O'odham and Piipaash, it's always been mentioned that we were farmers first. In doing that, as a part of our culture, history and sustainment of our

The 37th annual Red Mountain Eagle Powwow celebrated Indian Country once again in the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community on Nov. 2 and 3 at the Salt River Ballfield.

Many distinguished tribal leaders, seniors, performers, dancers, singers and more joined emcees Bart Powaukee (Northern Ute) and Ruben Little Head (Northern Cheyenne) for a weekend of celebrating.

Additionally, writer/director Tazbah Chavez (Bishop Paiute/Nüümü/Diné/ San Carlos Apache), actor Thosh Collins (Akimel O'odham/Seneca/Osage) and musician AntoineX (Omaha/Oglala/Sicangu Lakota) attended the powwow, which saw a record number of guests this year.

The two-day celebration featured close to \$40,000 in prize money across six performing categories: Golden Age (60+), Senior





### **Boarding School Oral History Proj**ect Set for Phoenix Valley

The National Native American Boarding School Healing Coalition will be in Chandler, Arizona, in December as part of its Oral History

The coalition has been traveling the country to interview Indian boarding school survivors as part of the project.

The Arizona agenda includes an opening ceremony and community dinner on Sunday, Dec. 14, followed by four days of oral history interviews. A closing ceremony and dinner will take place on Thursday, Dec. 18. Interviews are by appointment only and intended for those who attended a federally supported Indian boarding school prior to 1970. ### **Phoenix Indian Center Event Sets** Fundraising Record

The Phoenix Indian Center's Silver & Turquoise Ball raised more than \$750,000 to support the nonprofit's programs and services.

The event was held on Oct. 17 at Talking Stick Resort. It generated record attendance.

Linda Benally (Navajo) was honored with the Leon Grant Spirit of the Community Award for her leadership and contributions to the Native community. Benally is an attorney and founder of the Native American Bar Association of Arizona.

### **Indian Gaming Association Names** New Chairman

David Z. Bean has assumed the role of chairman of the Indian Gaming Association.

Bean is from the Puyallup Tribe of Indians and served as vice chairman for the association. He fills the seat of longtime Chairman Ernie Stevens Jr., who died unexpectedly on Sept. 26. Stevens was re-elected earlier this year and had served for the organization more than two decades. Bean will serve out the remainder of Stevens' term under the association's bylaws.

The gaming association will hold elections for the vice chairman and treasurer positions at its annual convention in March.

### S'edav Va'aki Museum Indian Market Scheduled

The 48th annual S'edav Va'aki Museum Indian Market in Phoenix is scheduled for the weekend of Dec. 13.

The event, formerly known as the Pueblo Grande Museum Indian Market, will take place from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday and Sunday. It features dozens of artisan booths, Native American performances and Native foods.

The cost is \$10 for general admission. Admission is \$5 for Native people, military members and first responders.

### Pascua Yaqui Tribe Council Member to Lead Arizona Indian Gaming Association

Rolando Flores is the new chairman of the Arizona Indian Gaming Association. Flores serves on the council for the Pascua Yaqui Tribe.

The AIGA was established in 1994 and represents eight of the 22 federally recognized tribes in Arizona. It is governed by a volunteer executive committee and board of directors composed of tribal elected officials.





The Salt River Food Bank received a \$6,000 check on Oct. 28 from members of the Salt River Business Owners Association (SRBOA).

SRBOA is an autonomous organization of "volunteer" business owners who are members of the Community. The Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community Council unanimously approved resolution SR-2535-2007 recognizing SRBOA as an active organization within the Community on Dec.

David Dallas, of Dallas Construction, is the president of the association When he and other SRBOA members received word from SRPMIC Council member Jacob Butler that food bank donations from local organizations have been decreasing, they pooled some money to donate.

"We're excited [to work together and donate] and it's a blessing for us to do this. Everybody jumped in right away," said Dallas.

Social Services Manager Winterelk Valencia at the food bank said that the money from the donation will be used as soon as possible to supplement donations with canned goods, turkeys and other food items.

Valencia will be working with SR-BOA to host a Community-wide food

drive. He hopes to potentially help fund Thanksgiving dinner boxes with the donation.

"Now, with the SNAP benefits in jeopardy, it's good to have a conversation about ways that our own people can help each other out," said Butler, who was present at the gathering for the donation presentation.

"These are small, local tribal member—owned businesses. It's awesome to see you contributing to the welfare of the Community," he said.

Other SRBOA members in leadership positions are Vice-President Chuvak Montiel-Nunez from On-Auk-Mor Trade Centers and Secretary Georgia Acosta from Acosta Plastering.

The Peeposh Veterans Association from the Gila River Indian Community (District 7), Miss Salt River 2025-2026 Emma Scabby, Billings (Montana) Pow-Wow Princess Azaylea Medicine Horse and others highlighted the daytime grand entry.

Northern Cree, the Grammy Award—winning drum group, was the host drum.

"Yeah, it's hot outside," said emcee Little Head. "But if you dance, you'll cool off ... the old way," he said with his signature smile.

In fact, many did cool off in "the old way," as singers, dancers, performers and visitors celebrated their cultures, traditions and songs.

tribe, we always had those willing to defend what we had here in the Community," he stated.

Reina, a veteran himself, continued, "The first Arizona National Guard was made up of O'odham and Piipaash warriors. They served alongside the United States Army."

Reina listed the military campaigns in which Community men and women have served: World War I, World War II, Vietnam, Korea, Desert Shield, Desert Storm, Grenada, Panama and more.

"We have always recognized that our warriors have stood alongside the warriors, veterans and military of the United States," said Reina.

After the introduction, veteran and former SRPMIC Council member Tom Largo Sr. provided the opening blessing. "It's always a blessing to come together to honor and praise the God that gave us life," he said.

Isabella Dockerty, Piipaash education specialist, then sang the national anthem in O'odham. As she performed, the Westwood High School Junior Reserve Officers Training Corps (JROTC) paraded the colors.

Additionally, the Westwood marching band performed. This year's band features SRPMIC superstar studentmusician Ella McGilbary on clarinet.

Later, SRPMIC President Martin Harvier reiterated the importance of

celebrating veterans, as well as how Native languages were used in conflict on behalf the federal government. "There's a picture that was [published] by the Arizona Republic on Feb. 9, 1941, and [it] shows Wesley Antone and Herbert Emerson using walkie-talkies to send messages in the O'odham language," he said.

Harvier's speech also highlighted the ongoing construction of the Lehi Veterans Memorial at the Lehi Cemetery. He later revealed that the Community will soon be constructing a Veterans Memorial at the Salt River Cemetery. "I know that our veterans will play a big role in that project," he said.

Kurt Thomas, a Community member veteran, and Joseph Fernandez, an employee veteran who works for the Salt River Police Department, also provided

"I joined the United States Marine Corps in 2003, shortly after 9/11. I did two tours, both combat," began Thomas. He was overcome with emotion but remained calm as he extended his appreciation to the Community. Thomas is currently a supervisor for SRPMIC Health and Human Services.

Fernandez (Pascua Yaqui) spoke with deep conviction. "Before joining the Community [in the police records department], I did four years enlisted in the Navy, onboard the USS Washington. It was a pretty common occurrence at that time to look out into the ocean and see nothing else—no boat, no land, just the team members and shipmates with

"A group of 5,000 of us, no matter your background or where you came from, took you in with one important thing, which was the mission, and to be a uniformed team to complete that goal. From my experience working here, I'm proud to say I see that exact same commitment to teamwork from our employee and Community veterans," he stated.

As the celebration neared its conclusion, veteran and SRPMIC Community Manager Bryan Meyers read a new SRPMIC proclamation that highlights and honors the birthdays of all six branches of the U.S. military.

Afterward, a roll call was held in which Community veterans announced their names and the branch of the military in which they served. The Council members thanked every veteran who participated in the roll call.

Later, Len Andrews, a veteran of the U.S. Marine Corps, provided the closing prayer: "We ask for your divine healing touch upon the lives of our veterans, who carry wounds of battle, both visible and hidden. May your love restore their spirits."

### Public Comments on Proposed Amendments to the Divorce Ordinance – Chapter 10, Article 2, Division 1

Comment Period: September 25-December 23, 2025

On Wednesday, September 24, 2025, the SRPMIC Council approved a 90-day public comment period for the following proposed amendments to the Community's Divorce Ordinance ("Ordinance"). The changes to the Ordinance are summarized below:

- Add no-fault divorce and legal separation;
- · Provide more guidance on actions the Community Court can take, along with issuing a divorce order (e.g., property distribution, name change, etc.);
- More guidelines surrounding alimony and child support; and,
- Allow parties to create their own separation agreement to be approved by the Court.

The public comment period lasts until December 23, 2025. The Legal Services Office and Office of General Counsel will attend district meetings within the Community to discuss the Ordinance, answer questions, and collect comments.

Unified Arizona Veterans is a 501(c) (3) organization established in 1981 consisting of over 50 veteran service organizations focused on promoting veteran-related affairs endorsed by most of its membership.

# Fiber Broadband Association Hosts Regional Conference in Scottsdale

In today's fast-paced digital world where everything seems to be geared toward online streaming, whether it's music, movies or live-broadcasting gatherings, the ability to stay connected with each other remains a focal point for many.

On Oct. 16, the Fiber Broadband Association (FBA) hosted the Regional Fiber Connect conference at the Scottsdale Resort & Spa.

Founded in 2001, the nonprofit is composed of companies and organizations that utilize direct fiber-optic connections and more to help refine and improve the way we communicate with one another online.

### What Is Fiber-Optic Broadband Internet?

Fiber-optic broadband uses very thin glass cables to send data as light. The thin glass cables are about the width of a strand of human hair. This is a faster type of internet connection, as older models utilizing copper wires and cables can erode and disintegrate over time.

Each fiber-optic cable contains a core and cladding. The core is where the light is carried, while the cladding ensures the light remains inside of the core.

When the light reaches its destination, such as a router or another computer, the receiver detects the light and converts it back into signals that our devices and tablets can understand, such as website pages, streaming video and more.

This technology is well suited for cities, small towns and tribal nations alike due to its ability to connect users with high-speed internet without being impacted by severe weather conditions.

### The Conference

At the opening of the daylong conference, Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community Vice-President Ricardo Leonard provided a blessing as well as opening remarks. Afterward, Arizona Gov. Katie Hobbs provided the morning's remarks

There were several morning "fireside chats" during the conference. Robert Griffin, broadband director for the Choctaw Nation of Oklahoma, spoke about tribal broadband and how its programs can aid as well as prioritize tribal communities. Later, a breakout session titled "Tribes Helping Tribes: Building a Strong Future Together Through Indigenous-Led Telecom Infrastructure Projects" discussed creating potential plans on how to get Indigenous communities connected to the internet safely and securely.

The conference also provided an update regarding the collaboration between the Dolly Parton Imagination Library (DPIL) and the FBA program. The DPIL encourages early literacy by mailing free books to children from birth to age 5. The program does not use a family's income as a determining factor, thus allowing for all families to participate.

In June, the FBA announced a partnership with the DPIL to benefit families across the United States and Canada by continuing to mail out books as well as establishing reliable and safe connections to the internet in various communities where internet service may not be readily provided.

"She's going to need the support from the Community; she's going to be traveling everywhere," Pongyesvia said.

After those opening remarks, SPRMIC Vice-President Ricardo Leonard provided a blessing that asked for safe travels for King, as well as for those in attendance. Later, he detailed the joy he's experienced watching her grow up.

"I've known Sialik since she was a little girl, when she used to come in and dance with us," said Leonard.

Chloe Lavahe Eskey (Navajo) supported King by attending the celebration as well. Eskey stayed to mingle with Community members and later join in on the dancing that ended the night's festivities.

The Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community held its annual Fall Overhaul in October.

The event is an employee service project that is used to foster Community service and department bonding. It includes clean-up activities throughout the Community and took place on the morning of Friday, Oct. 24. The Community Development Department (CDD) organized this event, and employees from various departments joined in and gave back to the Community. Each employee received a shirt and lunch.

On Oct. 25, there was an opportunity for Community members to drop off household hazardous waste or paper for shredding at a collection event. A total of 12,484 pounds of waste was collected, and 5,700 pounds of paper was shredded and disposed of. In all, 180 vehicles dropped off items and staff members conducted 38 pickups for seniors.

# Native Comedy Night with Tonia Jo Hall and James & Ernie

Salt River showed up in numbers to see comedians Tonia Jo Hall and James & Ernie, who sold out a packed matinee and evening Native Comedy Night at the Showroom at Casino Arizona on Nov. 2.

The matinee show was added by popular demand. Hall is a proud member of the Lakota, Dakota, Hidatsa MHA Nation and the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe, and James & Ernie (James Junes and Ernest David Tsosie) are from the Navajo Nation.

O'odham Action News spoke with Hall and James & Ernie before their show.

Hall is well known for her viral YouTube videos. She is also a jingle dress dancer and motivational speaker who champions sobriety and healthy living. James & Ernie are also sober and drug-free performers and motivational speakers.

"Auntie Beachress brings that crazy rez humor that comes straight from the aunties who raised us, the ones who tell it like it is but also lift you up when you need it most. I'll be sharing laughs, life lessons and some moments that might hit close to home," said Hall, who was hyped about performing in the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community for the first time. "Auntie Beachress" is her onstage alter ego.

"I know there's a strong sense of culture and pride here, and I'm looking forward to connecting with the audience and hopefully making them laugh so hard they forget about all their bills for a night. The energy from Native crowds is always next level, and I know Salt River's going to show up."

Hall said that when Native folks come out to see Native comedians, it's more than just a show. It's community. It's healing through humor.

"We've been through a lot, and laughter is one of our strongest medicines. So, when we can come together, laugh together, and celebrate who we are, that's a good night," said Hall. "There's something powerful about seeing our own people on stage telling stories we grew up with—the humor, the aunties, the family gatherings, those moments that only make sense in our communities."

James & Ernie have their own unique style onstage. They work off each other's energy without using notes.

"That's what works best for us," said Junes.

"Ernie is a solo act in himself and then I'm a solo act as well. But when the two come together, you're mixing another ingredient. If you're making dough or frybread or if you're making dessert or whatever, these are two of what I feel are the good, the great material that has sustained us for the past 25 years."

O'odham Action News talked with James & Ernie for a recent podcast episode.

If you've never heard of James & Ernie's comedy, "Where have you been?" Junes asked with a chuckle. The duo has performed in the Phoenix area several times over the years.

The two originally met in 2001 at an amateur comedy competition show in Farmington, New Mexico, at the Farmington Civic Center.

A year later, in April 2002, they shared the stage for the first time in Tuba City. The show ran behind schedule, "on Indian time," Tsosie recalled.

"So, they asked James and I to go on together, but we didn't want to because we were solo acts at the time. The lady in charge was kind of pleading 'Please!' so we reluctantly said okay," said Tsosie.

"We had 20 minutes onstage, and that was the day that James & Ernie was born."

They originally called themselves Mutton and Stew Productions and had that name for a short period of time.

"The problem was that everyone would ask, 'Who's Mutton and who's Stew, and where's Frybread?" joked Tsosie.

Like Hall, the duo are sober comedians. They openly talk about their healing comedy and surviving drug addiction, alcoholism and more. Tsosie stands by an equation that many comedians use: pain plus time equals comedy.

"We've always wanted to weave in what our

struggles were, and that's overcoming these obstacles like addiction," said Junes.

"It's not just substances. We can be addicted to anything. Money, fame, fortune, notoriety. You can be addicted to social media. You can be addicted to the past, to trauma."

Tsosie feels the duo is helping people on the spiritual, mental and physical levels while also using humor to grab the attention of people.

"It's a separate act in itself that is different from live standup, traditional comedy," said Tsosie.

Hall has a couple of creative projects in the works. She has a part in an upcoming small film and is recording songs in the studio with her husband, Joel Wood, for his new album. The two have a collaborative live show called "Coffee and Stories with Auntie" and "Sing Along with Uncle."

## Teen Dating Violence: How to Identify the Signs and Help

Abuse is never okay. Thankfully, the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community continues to create a safe and supportive space for all.

Teen dating violence is defined as physical, psychological and/or sexual abuse, as well as harassment and stalking, of any person age 12 to 18. Whether it's a past relationship or a current one, teen dating violence affects millions of young people in the United States.

On Oct. 28, Health Educator Melanie Nosie of SRPMIC Health and Human Services Prevention and Intervention facilitated a webinar on teen dating violence as part of the "Education Tuesday" webinar series. According to the U.S. Centers for Disease

According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 1 in 3 people will experience some form of abuse in teen relationships. In the same study, female students experienced higher rates of dating violence compared with males. The report also revealed higher teen dating violence rates for students who identify as 2SLGBTQIA+.

"As parents, guardians, aunties and uncles, we try to do our best to inform our children on what is okay. For some of us, it's even hard to navigate that," said Nosie.

She added, "If they experience dating vio-

lence as teens, that trauma can continue with them as they enter adulthood. It's not a good thing and it impacts a lot of people."

Throughout the presentation, Nosie reiterated that teen dating violence is a challenging subject and allowed attendees to take a moment for themselves if they needed.

Later, many of the 120-plus guests who have children at home began sharing their experiences via the webinar chat.

Nosie thanked those who shared a part of themselves with the group. "We know our teens go through changes—emotionally,

physically, socially, etc. Even in middle school. [For the youth, this period] can be exciting but also challenging," she noted.

Insults, intimidation, humiliation, jealousy and showing up unannounced are forms of teen dating violence. None of these behaviors is acceptable, and if individuals finds themselves experiencing these situations, they should contact the proper authorities, such as the police as well as mental health professionals.

### What Can You Do as Parents/Guardians?

Preventing our youth from being abused as they navigate dating and relationships is crucial, as is educating them about the different characteristics of healthy and unhealthy relationships.

As teenagers mature into young adults, a key action parents and guardians can take to ensure their teenagers are supported and well informed is to model healthy relationships at home. When teenagers see aggression, yelling or bullying at home, that negatively impacts their development, even if the teenager presents themselves to adults as if everything is fine.

When parents/guardians encourage authentic and open communication with their teens, the positive results of those efforts extend well into the adult years. Without a solid foundation of positive support at home that allows for independence and individuality, teenagers are more likely to experience low self-esteem and fail to report abuse to the proper authorities and their family out of fear of being judged or criticized, which is a harmful result of shame and self-blame.

Simply put, teens experience a different society from the one adults and seniors grew up in. Today, there are ample resources and organizations that offer help to those who have experienced teen dating violence, thus proving that now is the right time to talk about these sensitive matters, as opposed to never discussing them and allowing trauma to go unrecognized and untreated.

Understanding this allows people to learn and grow together as families and as a community, a huge reason why the SRPMIC continues to host and promote this weekly webinar series.

"We want our kids to make good choices for themselves," concluded Nosie.
