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
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

The collaboration between The Foster Alliance and the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community continued on this 2025 holiday season with the donation of 75+ bikes, scooters and helmets for SRPMIC children.

Here in the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community, the 2025 holiday season got a bit sweeter thanks to some recent donations from a local nonprofit.

The Foster Alliance provides support to Arizona children enrolled in foster care and the families who care for them. In 2024, the nonprofit served nearly 10,000 children in the state, which included distributing nearly 3,000 back-to-school backpacks.

Furthermore, throughout the year the nonprofit provides foster families and children with essential services such as assistance with foster care licensing; the Birthday Dreams program, which helps celebrate birthdays with personalized gifts; as well as the annual toy drive for foster youth ages 0 to 21.

On Dec. 10, staff from The Foster Alliance filled two of their travel vans with bicycles, scooters and helmets for SRPMIC foster children enrolled with SRPMIC Social Services.


Community staff greeted The Foster Alliance and began unloading both vans. They held the bicycles and scooters in one of the nearby department conference rooms before the Social Services team began handing them out to children.

"We brought 61 bikes and 14 scooters, all with helmets," revealed Cierra Bos, director of finance and operations for The Foster Alliance. Bos was joined by her colleague, Shawn Pendergrast, director of programs, for the Community donation drop-off.

"These bikes and scooters were donated or funded through some of our corporate groups," shared Bos.

She also detailed that The Foster Alliance and the SRPMIC have enjoyed a collaboration for the last five years. "We have an ongoing partnership," said Bos with a cheerful smile.

on Dec. 13 and 14. Although the Phoenix museum recently changed its name, excitement for the annual market has stayed the same. Museum representative Rosetta Walker said, "[The market] has been pretty steady because people know [that] Pueblo Grande, now S'edav Va'aki Museum, has been doing an Indian Market for the past 48 years. This is our third year with the new name.'

She said that they are always looking for people to perform at the event. "I help get performers by going to other markets throughout the Valley and approaching them and seeing them, and we do try to stick with the southern tribes' performers because we are on the lands of the Hohokam," said Walker. The performers at this year's market included hoop dancer Tony Duncan, Gertie and the T.O. Boyz, O'odham dance group Chi'Chino Spirit, musician Gabriel Ayala and Jazzmenco. There were also tribal royalty presenta-

This year's featured market artist was August Wood, a Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community member. Wood was selected by the museum's association. "We are so excited August was available and said yes to our ask. August has been at the museum for a number of years, and his mentor was the late Ron Carlos, from whom he learned how to do the paddle board pottery method. He's demonstrating pottery today and also has the baskets," said Walker.

Wood shared some words about his experience as the market began on the first day. "A little bit of relief, excited, overwhelmed and tired, you know. It's been a long process going through everything that has happened so far. But to be here and to show off what I've been making has been pretty exciting and well received this morning so far. We'll see how today goes and tomorrow goes."

Miss Indian Arizona Sialik King attended the market, sharing a welcome greeting and a traditional O'odham song. The event also included a special market for young artists.

Scholars:

Healthcare students who have shown interest and previous self-study of medicine that is indigenous, ancestral, ancient, natural, food-based, nutrient-based, botanical, alternative or integrative are welcome to apply.

Indigenous healthcare students who plan to practice on indigenous lands are urged to consider this opportunity to explore the medicine of the ancestors, and are urged to apply. One student will be selected to receive the scholarship each term.

Sponsors:

First Nation Medical Board, together with Nature Works Best Medical Clinic and Dr. Colleen Huber are funding this scholarship. Colleen Huber, NMD, CTP is a Naturopathic Medical Doctor and Certified Tribal Practitioner.

When:

Each semester, one day per week, during daytime business hours.

Where:

Dr. Huber meets with patients on tribal land, at the Salt River Pima Maricopa Indian Community (SRPMIC).

Award and Certificate:

Scholars will receive a stipend for the semester of \$2,000. A Certificate of Completion will be provided at the last weekly meeting of the semester.

Learning experience:

Aside from patients' visits and consults, pending each patient's permission, scholars will be assigned reading and further self-directed research on topics related to biochemical, metabolic and pharmacological impacts of medicinal plants and foods native to the region of and surrounding SRPMIC, central Arizona and the desert southwest generally, and how those plants are used medicinally today and in centuries past. Emphasis will be given to exploring the root causes of disease, treating the whole person, and First Do No Harm.

National Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day at USS Arizona Memorial Gardens at Salt River

Visitors lined up along the edge of the parking lot at the USS Arizona Memorial Gardens at Salt River on Dec. 7 for the annual National Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day Commemoration hosted by the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community.

"Today, we gather to reflect on the events of Dec. 7, 1941, when the attack on Pearl Harbor forever changed the course of our nation's history," began Pacer Reina, SRPMIC member and veteran of the U.S. Army 82nd Airborne Division (operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm).

"On that fateful morning, 353 Imperial Japanese aircraft launched from six aircraft carriers carried out a devastating surprise attack on the U.S. Navy base at Pearl Harbor. In a matter of minutes, 188 American aircraft were destroyed and all eight battleships and ports sustained damage."

The attack cost the lives of 2,403 service members and civilians, wounding 1,178 more.

One of the Navy ships docked at Pearl Harbor on that Sunday morning was the USS Arizona BB-39, which was named in honor of the state. Only 334 crew members aboard the ship survived the morning attack, which left 1,177 dead. The last living survivor of the attack on the USS Arizona, Lou Conter, died in 2024 at the age of 102.

The Memorial Gardens are built around a boathouse relic, which is a large piece of the USS Arizona. The relic was originally promised to a veteran's group in Honolulu, Hawai'i, by the U.S. Navy; however, the group agreed to part ways with it and the boathouse was gifted to the SRPMIC in 2018, thanks to efforts from a group that included SRPMIC Vice-President Ricardo Leonard

and Ric Hartman, retired Army captain and former vice-president of corporate relations at Casino Arizona and Talking Stick Resort.

The Community paid for the cost of crating the estimated 4,800-pound relic from Hawai'i to the SRPMIC.

"When [the relic] left Hawai'i, from my understanding, it was followed out by a battleship halfway, and they gave full honors," said Leonard on the first episode of the USS Arizona Podcast. "Once it got to the mainland, the Seabees took over. They brought it and started to ship over. All military protocol was followed."

This year's commemoration began at 10 a.m. and was followed by the annual breathing of the flag ceremony, which has been conducted on each Dec. 7 since 2007, when the Community, in partnership with American Legion Post 114 (Bushmasters), was granted ownership of a flag from the USS Arizona.

Following the flag breathing was an "echo" or "antiphonal" version of "Taps," a custom of sounding the call with two buglers standing at a distance from each other to create an "echo" sound. This was followed by a 21-gun salute and the laying of a wreath.

Jenny Bement (White Earth Nation) was one of the antiphonal "Taps" performers. She is a high school marching band teacher and tours with the 16-piece Julia Keefe Indigenous Big Band on trumpet.

"My grandfather was in the Navy,

so today was really important for me to come and honor him," said Bement, who has now been invited by Discover Salt River tourism to perform at this annual event twice.

Bement was stationed across the water from the other "Taps" player along the edge of the commemorative columns that outline the actual perimeter of the original ship.

"Antiphonal 'Taps' is important for call and response. It's like a hollow echo of people passing," explained Bement.

"The first player is honoring the person who died, in my artistic viewpoint. The second player, like myself, playing the antiphonal part so far away, is like whispers of the past coming forward. They're still here, they're still breathing, they're still with us—not in the physical realm, but spiritually, and that spirituality coming back as a second player."

Kevin Riding-In, who served in the U.S. Marine Corps as an 0311 rifleman and corporal (E-4), was the Officer of the Day. He announced the dignitaries and guests as they arrived to be seated for the program.

"It's an amazing thing to have the USS Arizona Memorial on tribal land, because there have been so many Native Americans that served in our armed forces," said Riding-In, who regularly contributes his time to the annual event. "The SRPMIC always has done a great job honoring our veterans."

SRPMIC member Isabella Dockerty sang the national anthem in the O'odham language. Former SRPMIC Council member Tom Largo gave the invocation. Major Jon Corey, Ph.D. was a guest speaker during the program. Former SRPMIC Museum Curator Thomas Jackson spoke at the lectern about the history of the USS Arizona.

"The USS Arizona was the biggest ship that was ever built [back in] 1917," said Jackson. "She was the biggest warship in the world. She was also [fuelbased]. So, every bit of her was state of the art. It was christened with two champagne bottles. Because of Prohibition, the governor decided to take water from one of our lakes and have it christened with those bottles."

Jackson also shared knowledge about the design of the Memorial Gardens.

"If you see the design, it is the actual size of the USS Arizona itself. We found the original blueprint and laid it down, and this is how wide and big the USS Arizona actually is."

The blueprint can be seen inside the relic room. After the program, from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m., the relic room was opened to the public.

To close out the commemoration, approximately 30 minutes after sunset at military twilight, the pillars in the water at the Memorial Gardens were illuminated in memory of those who died at Pearl Harbor.

PROPOSED TRUANCY CODE CHANGES

The Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community Council has approved proposed changes to the Truancy Code to move into the public comment period. This document explains what these changes accomplish and how they could benefit Community Members and families. Clean and redline copies of the changes are available for review.

- 1. THE NEW CODE FOCUSES ON SUPPORT, NOT
- This keeps kids in school by addressing problems early and supporting families.
- Current code relies mainly on fines issued to youth and/or parents
- New code requires schools to offer supportive services first: mentoring, counseling, tutoring,
- transportation help, and more. Emphasizes positive reinforcement, not punishment.
- 2. THE NEW CODE CREATES SHARED RESPONSIBILITY BETWEEN PARENTS,
- SCHOOLS, AND STUDENTS. Current code places most responsibility on the youth
- New code adds clear duties for parents and
- Clarifies definitions and requirements so that families
- become partners in solving attendance issues, not targets of blame.
- 3. THE NEW CODE REQUIRES EARLY, SUPPORTIVE INTERVENTION.
- Helps children and families before issues get worse Currently, action typically happens after violations
- New code begins support (not citation) after 3 unexcused absences. Requires creation of an Attendance Support Plan
- (ASP) with the family.
- 4. THE NEW CODE INCLUDES SERVICES AND SUPPORTS FOR PARENTS.
- Provides practical and cultural support to strengthen families. Examples include:
- Parenting workshops

- Cultural parenting circles
- Family counseling
- · Help accessing benefits, childcare, and healthcare
- 5. THE CODE ADDS REASONABLE CONSEQUENCES FOR PARENTS, BUT ONLY IF SUPPORTS ARE REFUSED OR INEFFECTIVE.
- Consequences are fair and tied directly to helping children succeed. Support always comes first.
- · If a parent refuses support, or if the supports are not effective in solving the attendance issue, the Court may order:
- Community service
- Parenting classes
- Weekly check-ins
- Education-related service projects
- Other consequences connected to school attendance THE NEW CODE STRENGTHENS CULTURAL
- VALUES AND COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT. Reflects Community values and promotes collective responsibility.
- · Encourages elder mentorship, community service, and cultural workshops.
- · Increases connection between families, schools, and tribal programs. 7. THE GOAL: BETTER ATTENDANCE, STRONGER
- FAMILIES, AND SAFER FUTURES. Improves student success and family stability across the Community.
- Reduces barriers to school attendance. · Encourages trust between schools and families.
- · Promotes healing rather than punishment. Ensures fairness and due process.
